A Red Cross official in China who recently returned to the United States, tells of a visit he made to Chungking to pay his respects to the Generalissimo and Madame Chiang Kai-shek before leaving for America. Seven times that day Japanese planes had raided the city and dropped bombs, killing many and destroying much property. The generalissimo explained that they were trying to find out where he was staying. After a simple dinner the visitor was asked to remain for evening devotions. They knelt together, and first Madame Chiang offered a prayer, then the guest prayed, and finally the generalissimo. He prayed for the American people to whom his guest was going then he prayed for his own Chinese people, and finally for the Japanese people whose representatives that day seven times had tried to kill him. Here is a man in whose heart is no bitterness, and no spirit of unforgiveness. How truly he has learned the spirit of Jesus, who prayed for those who nailed Him to the cross, "Father forgive them, for they know not what they do," recently a son of the generalissimo was baptized and received into the Christian church at Chungking, at which service his father was present, and one of the first to welcome him into Christian fellowship. Amen.
