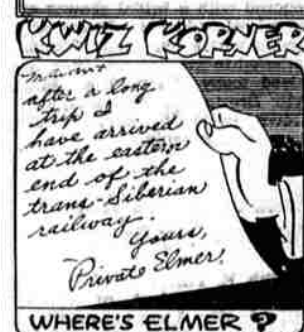

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Congress Cold to F. R.'s Request to Change Vote Bill

WASHINGTON, April 1.—(AP)—A holiday-bound congress read with interest today President Roosevelt's suggestions for changing the service vote law but there were no indications that anything would be done about them.

Senate Leader Barkley (D-Ky.) said that while he fully endorsed the president's proposal that the federal war ballot be made available to service men in this country as well as overseas and its use facilitated, he declined to predict that congress would act.

Appraised that the president had proposed that changes be made permitting all persons in uniform to use the federal ballot if they failed to get state ballots in time, even if the states had not validated it, Senator Taft (R-Ohio), said flatly:

"He won't get any such changes."

The new law, which became effective today without the president's signature, would make federal ballots available only to military personnel overseas and then only after the voter had requested, but had not received a state ballot by October 1.

The federal ballot could be used only if the governor of the state certified that it was acceptable under state laws.

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IMPROVED SUBSTITUTES

War has brought about use of hundreds—yes thousands of substitutes, for things we used to think were necessary. The feed business is no exception to the rule, and in spite of the many substitutes that have been forced into livestock and poultry, they still continue to produce about as usual. A miracle.

Once in awhile a new substitute proves to be superior to the article it replaced. For instance, ask any woman which she would choose as a birthday present, a pair of silk hose, or a pair of "NYLON". Silk was always fine, and probably always will be; Rayon was a poor substitute, but is acceptable these days. But Nylon? Boy, oh boy!

Semisolid buttermilk is a wonderful feed for pigs, chicks or turkeys. It was used extensively year ago, then faded out for a time in favor of dried milk. But just before the War, it staged a strong comeback, and proved its merits many times over. Came the War, and Semisolid became one of the scarce articles.

Now we have a new article on the market. It may well be considered a substitute for semisolid buttermilk, but like Nylon it is better than the article it replaces. In addition, it is not likely to become scarce, especially during the War, since it is a by-product of alcohol manufacturing.
