**Reported Suicide Cheats Prison of Former Executive**

ELKTON, Md., April 15.—(AP)—Joseph Ben Decker, 58, former Triumph Explosives executive under a three-year federal sentence for mail fraud, died today in a hospital of gunshot wounds. U. S. Marshal August Klecka said he was inflamed by Decker himself a few hours before he was to go to prison.

Decker's death occurred less than four hours after the shooting at his home on the outskirts of Elkton, and a short distance from the munitions plant where he formerly was vice-president and general manager.

Hospital attendants said he was shot in the chest.

Decker, a former Pittsburgh business man, lost last week an appeal to the U. S. supreme court from his conviction and sentences for using the mails to defraud and for violating the federal renegotiations act.

He was convicted, along with Gustav H. Kann, former Triumph president, in June, 1943. Decker had been free on bond since that time to permit appeals to the federal circuit court of appeals and the supreme court.

## Ortiz, King of Bantams, Again Defeats Olivera

LOS ANGELES, April 5.—(AP)—Manuel Ortiz went back to hauling vegetables today, and right with him was the world's bantamweight boxing crown he has successfully defended against 10 challengers in a year and a half.

The Imperial valley farmer from El Centro, Calif., won the unanimous decision of the judges in a 15-round title bout last night with Tony Olivera, of Oakland.

The victory was Ortiz' third over Olivera. Last year the titleholder won a technical knockout, and previously a decision, over the Oakland boy. Back in 1941, however, Ortiz lost a decision to Olivera, and this marked the last time the El Centro fighter was defeated.

## Sammy Angott Snaps Perry's Winning Streak

WASHINGTON, April 5.—(AP)—Angott, who lost his lightweight crown to Juan Zurita of

Mexico last month, showed last night that he still has the championship urge. He pounded out a decisive 10-round verdict over Aaron Perry, 18-year-old Washington Negro billed as a sensational fistic prospect. The decision broke Perry's streak of 16 consecutive wins.
