The afternoon was spent in playing games and in the evening they all attended the show together.

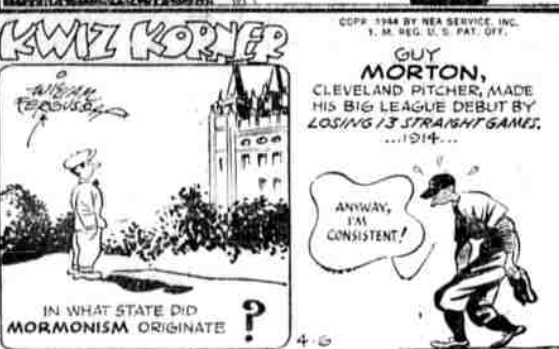
RIVERSDALE GRANGE TO MEET FRIDAY NIGHT
