Scout Expansion In Douglas County Leads District

"The people in Douglas county are lacking the Boy Scout movement with more enthusiasm and hard work than those of any other of the six counties in the Oregon Trail council" said J. R. Bruckart, president of the Boy Scout council in a letter received today by B. C. Elliott, district scout chairman.

The Boy Scout movement is doing a concrete job in helping to solve the youth problems of this area as evidenced by the membership figures for the end of March, just released by the scout office in Eugene. One year ago January when the scout leaders of the district determined upon an aggressive plan of expansion, a total of 105 boys were in scouting in the district. On April 1, 1944, just 15 months later, this total had climbed to exactly 300. New troops have been organized, new leadership recruited and trained, and the program made available to an expanding group of boys throughout the county. In spite of the many problems confronting men of all ages these days, the total number of adult men engaged in scouting leadership in the district has risen from 30 to 84.

The present membership figure of 384 men and boys does not take into account the four new troops now organizing in the district, but which are not as yet officially registered. According to K. A. Wells, scout executive, "This is the largest gain made by any district in the entire six-county council and now gives to the Douglas district the enviable position of leading all of the districts in the number of scouts and cuts registered in relation to their boy population."

Airways Plan for Feeder Service is Explained Here

The plan of the Southwest Airways for inauguration of feeder air lines in Washington, Oregon and California was explained here Wednesday evening to a committee of the Roseburg chamber of commerce by W. J. R. Simms, operations manager, and Paul G. Sturges, public relations director.

The company, which is now operating a feeder service for army camps in California, while maintaining four major training schools for the army air forces, is planning to extend its service as soon as equipment is obtainable, providing federal authority is secured, it was stated.

The organization includes 400 pilots, 1150 mechanics and 450 additional employes in various phases of the ground work. The personnel is now engaged in duties connected with the war effort, but at the end of the war they will be released for civilian work, it was stated.

Plans have been made whereby plane connections would be given all of the principal towns of Oregon, to connect at Portland and Medford with transcontinental air lines. The planes would handle mail, express and passenger services. Schedules starting with three planes daily in each direction would be augmented as rapidly as business justified, the officers said. The application for federal authority will provide for added schedules as soon as a 50 per cent load factor is reached on any established schedule.

A new type of twin-engine plane, especially designed for the type of service proposed, has been developed, it was stated. It will carry from 10 to 12 passengers in addition to a large express and mail load.

A pre-hearing conference is to be held by the Civil Aeronautics board in the near future, the chamber of commerce committee was told, and it was requested that data be filed to show Roseburg's transportation needs. No endorsement of the company's plan was requested.
