Pacifists Menace War Preparation, Maj. Micelli Says

Pacifists already are attempting to defeat a program of adequate preparedness against future war, Major Victor J. Micelli, vice-commander of the Oregon department, American Legion, told members of the Roseburg Rotary club at the club's luncheon meeting Thursday.

Well-attended meetings of pacifists have protested universal military training, have urged abandonment of unconditional surrender demands, praised non-resistance, and urged reduction of the army and navy personnel and equipment as an example to other nations, Major Micelli said.

Pointing out that the United States has been badly handicapped in past wars because it lacked the arms and equipment for its citizen armies and that heavy losses and long delays have resulted from failure to have a trained force in readiness for emergencies, Micelli declared that unless victory in the current war is followed by a program of adequate preparedness, "The grandchildren of those who fought in World War I and the sons of those fighting in World War II will again be on the battle front and it may well be a final losing battle."

He urged continuance of strong civilian defense organizations, pointing out that the danger of suicide attacks against the United States increases as allied victories continue. The necessity for preserving morale among the people of the axis powers he said, will necessitate forays, suicidal though they may be, against vulnerable areas in the United States.

"It Can Happen Here," was the title of his address, and he pointed out the continuing danger of enemy attack and sabotage, urging cooperation and unified effort in preserving civilian defense, adequate protection against saboteurs and insistence upon strong military power following the war.

Vet Kills Chinese in Mistake for Jap, Charge

ASTORIA, Ore., April 7.—(AP)—Walter Harold Johnson, 20-year-old sailor accused of killing a Chinese he mistook for a Japanese, pleaded innocent to a second degree murder charge yesterday.

The body of Tung Quan Woo, 56, was discovered in an irrigation ditch Tuesday. Death was caused by drowning.

Johnson, a veteran of Tarawa, is from Sacramento, Calif.

"I wonder if Bill thinks he has been paying his taxes the 'easy way'?"

"Bill is too smart to be taken in by the tax arguments of the saloon crowd, he just drinks because he wants to, or maybe he can't help himself."

"I saw in the paper that Uncle Sam spent only fifty seven cents to collect each hundred dollars of internal revenue last year."

"Yes, and for every dollar the saloon turns in in taxes it collects three dollars from the public. That's what I call paying taxes the expensive way."

"Could the Federal Government get along without the tax money collected from the public by the saloons?"

"Of course it could. Last year less than ten percent of the total Federal revenue came from liquor taxes."

"A lot of people know that the whole liquor tax argument is simply a smoke screen. The saloon crowd wants to keep legal the business of starting non-drinkers to drink, of getting moderate drinkers, like Bill, to drink more, and to satisfy the drunkard."

"That's about right. Let's give Bill a hand before he gets into trouble."

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
