The young mother, whose husband is overseas with the U. S. army, discovered the flames as she opened the door to the upstairs of her house just prior to leaving for a shopping trip. She was burned on the face and arms attempting to save the child.

Control of Root Weevils, Spittle Bugs Now Advised

Control of spittle bugs and root weevils on strawberries this year will probably pay better dividends than usual because of the certain demand at good prices for all that can be grown, says J. Roland Parker, county agent. Recent crop reports indicate that the acreage of strawberries in Washington and Oregon to be harvested this year will be 20 per cent under last year.

Entomologists at Oregon State college report that spittle bugs are already beginning to hatch from over-winter eggs on strawberry plants and that earlier areas, in the Willamette valley at least, might well begin dusting the first week in April. As soon as the first spittle masses appear, the application of 1 per cent rotenone dust is due. Early injury is frequently severe to developing leaves and fruit spurs.

On large plantings the rotenone dust is applied at the rate of 50 to 60 pounds per acre, with either a hooded power duster or some type of rotary fan or blower. For smaller plantings various types of hand dusters are available. A thorough job of dusting which reaches the under side of leaves as well as the top surface is recommended, with a second application sometimes necessary two weeks after the first if spittle masses reappear.

Strawberry root weevils are also working, and are feeding on leaves preparatory to egg laying. Two groups of weevils are serious in most parts of Oregon, the early group of which is due for baiting at once. Growers are advised to examine their plantings and if weevils are found around the base of the plants, or if injury to the leaves known as "ragging" is present, immediate application of bait is needed.

Use of the commercially prepared apple pomace or similar fruit bait is suggested this year, as bran and sugar for homemade bait are difficult to obtain. A hundred pounds of bait applied at the rate of one tablespoonful in the crown or beside the crown of each plant will treat one to three acres.



TRUCK MAINTENANCE

To give Oregon farmers all possible help in keeping farm trucks rolling for the duration, county farm transportation committees are appointing members to direct truck maintenance programs in each county. Maintenance members will work with ODT in obtaining needed parts, tires and shop service to keep farm trucks in operation. The member who will head up the program in this county will be announced shortly by the committee.

FEED WHEAT ALLOCATIONS

A feed wheat allocation plan, aimed at more efficient and equitable distribution of commodity credit feed wheat and to carry out the objective of giving milk cows and laying hens first priority has been announced by the War Food administration. Under the plan, allocation certificates will be supplied to eligible purchasers on the basis of 1943 sales and relative feed requirements and supplies available in the area.

By limiting sales in principal grain producing areas, it is expected that Oregon allocations under the program will be adequate to take care of feeders' requirements in feed importing areas. The plan also is expected to result in more prompt filling of orders, and in a larger proportion of feed wheat being made available to small dealers and mixers.

WIRE FOR RANGE FENCING

Ranchers who have postponed building new fences needed to obtain efficient use of rangelands because of inability to get materials should now find the situa-

tion much improved this year. Both barbed wire and woven wire are being produced in quantities equal to the highest pre-war production level, and the supply situation will continue to improve during the year.

The 1944 AAA program provides payment for fencing grazing lands as a supplement to the range management practice. Filing of a management plan with the county committee before May 1 is required for this practice, which is aimed at keeping rangelands in condition for continued peak production of meat and wool.

TRACTOR TIRES SCARCE

The need for saving the limited stock of new agricultural tires to provide for replacements during the coming season has forced suspension of the program through which county AAA committees could authorize conversion of farm tractors and implements from steel to rubber for custom work. The suspension action emphasizes the need for repair and retreading to make present tires last as long as possible.

HOG RESTRICTIONS OFF

Farmers can slaughter hogs without a permit or license and deliver any quantity of pork to persons not living on the farm until March 17 as a result of a month's extension by WFA of the period in which home-slaughter restriction on hogs are suspended. Farmers are required to collect ration points for pork delivered, but may accept them in advance of their validation dates.

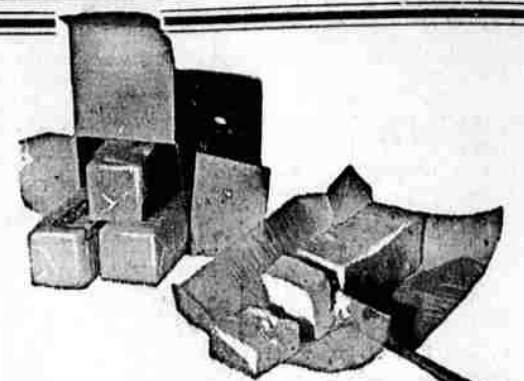
\$1,400 Reward Posted in Dog Tongue-Cutting Case
