American Legion Auxiliary Activities

"The Omnibus bill is the best piece of legislation that has gone through congress for veterans of this war," said Oregon department commander of the American Legion, Dan McDade when he visited the Roseburg post last Tuesday night. Mrs. McDade accompanied her husband and visited the auxiliary the same night. Other department officers who were in the commanders party were vice-commander Victor Micelli, Adjutant Fritz Nissen and service officer Robert Dillard.

Mr. Dillard, in speaking to the joint groups, urged that anyone having knowledge of returned veterans who are entitled to benefits get in touch with the post service officer Roy Young who will help the veteran obtain such benefits. He also urged that these returning men affiliate themselves with the Legion, which organization has knowledge of facilities and means to obtain the benefits they are entitled to. Over 450 claims pass through the Portland veterans facility a month, he stated, and although the national average of claims allowed is only 40% that of Oregon is much higher. Adjutant Fritz Nissen told the group that they hope to have an Oregon Legion membership of 17,000 by summer.

Mrs. L. A. Rhoden unit president reported that over \$80.00 has been given to local child welfare to date. It was voted to give \$25 to the American Red Cross clubmobiles and to donate more as funds permit. It was reported that the Redport auxiliary has "adopted" Helen Gorrell, staff assistant of the American Red Cross now in New Guinea, who is in charge of one of the clubmobiles close to the battle front. Letters received from Miss Gorrell indicate that her clubmobile has gone as far to the front as women are allowed.

Following the meeting the Legion served refreshments to veterans, their wives and auxiliary members and to the many navy and army men of this war who were present.

Among those home on furlough were Clyde Carstens, Jr., seaman first class who has been action in the South Pacific for eighteen months. Incidentally Clyde said those tough Pacific beauties had to be taught to use lipstick! He also talked later to Bob Sullivan who has been in the same area for many months. Several ships on which he had been were torpedoed and in fact Bob completed his radar schooling in Pearl Harbor while his ship was in dry dock for repairs.
