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MAKE ROOM FOR GROWTH

Invasion Day is close at hand. During the next few weeks thousands of little turkeys will bow their way into Douglas County. They will receive a warm welcome, and we hope their stay of seven or eight months will be pleasant for them, and that a very high percentage of them will eventually decorate some holiday table, or some service man's mess plate.

The percentage which does make the grade will be largely due to the care given them by you, the grower. We don't know for sure if more or less turkeys will be grown in Douglas County this year. But in many instances, we feel sure there will be a tendency to put too many poult under one brooder.

It has always been done, and probably always will. There are too many laws, but if one more was needed, it should be that no turkey grower would be allowed to brood more than 300 poult in one lot.

Even for that number, a brooder room should be at least fourteen feet square, or the equivalent. High mortality in normal poults is largely due to crowding, high temperatures and dark brooder houses. And crowding is probably the worst of the three.

Everybody sooner or later comes out with a seven, ten or fourteen point program. Even OPA makes a lot of fuss about points. We have heard a lot of stories about points. So here is a little five point program of our own on raising poults:

(1) Plenty of room; at least 3 1/4 sq. ft. per poult. (2) Plenty of light; poults are wild by nature and timid. They need light to find their feed. (3) Plenty of fresh air, but not hot air; just warm. (4) Plenty of good feed. Good for poults and good for your pocketbook. (5) Plenty of
