Navy Ace Home on Leave

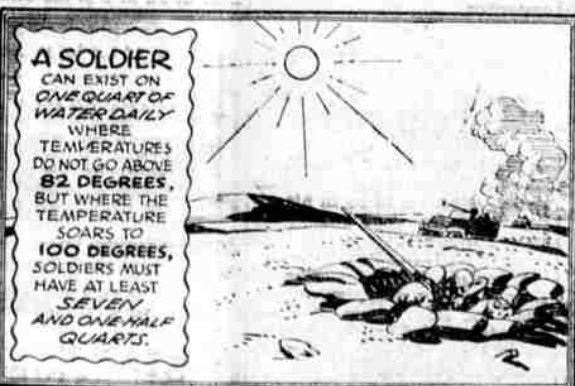

Little War Action Occurs in Italy

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Naples, April 11.—(AP)—Italian troops holding Mt. Morrone, mile-high peak 15 miles northeast of Cassino, have repulsed German thrusts at two points.

An American ambush patrol on the Anzio beachhead, meanwhile, trapped a six-man German patrol, three miles west of Littoria, killing three and wounding two. British troops two miles southeast of Carroceto on the other side of the beachhead drove off a German platoon with casualties and other Nazi attempts at infiltration in that sector were repulsed.

As shelling and patrol clashes continued along the main Fifth army front a headquarters commentator said that recent German replacements in Italy have included soldiers who lost some of their toes as a result of frostbite on the Russian front.

Allied planes hammered at German communications yesterday.
