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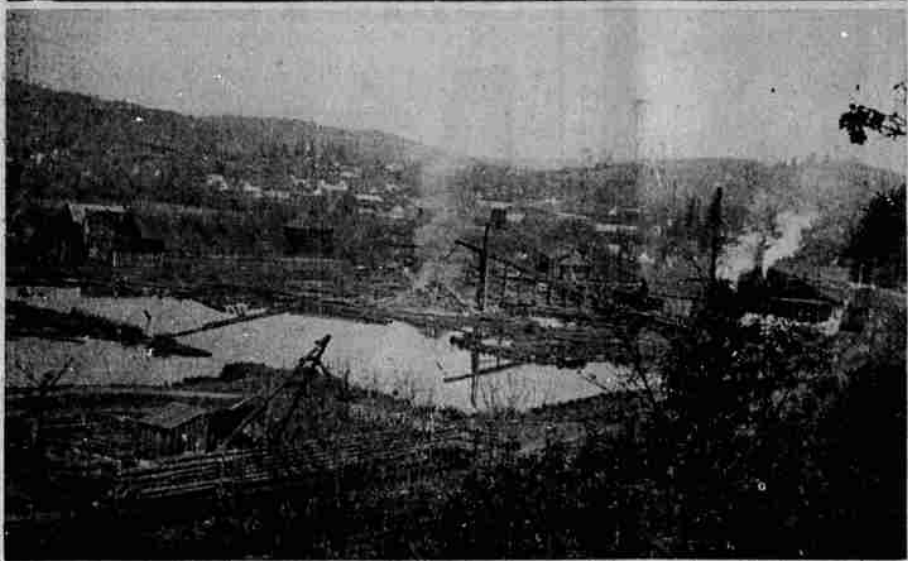

THE SAWMILL and planer at Oakland, owned by T. H. Garrison and E. G. Young, bankers of that town, who bought and reconstructed the mill three years ago. It has a cutting capacity of 30,000 board feet daily, employs 25 men and is supplied with logs from a 135 million feet timber stand which the company

owns on Hubbard creek. Trucking from timber to mill is done by contract. Docks are roofed and adjoin the main line of the Southern Pacific railway. Pond capacity has been enlarged from an initial 40,000 feet to one million. "We are going to do most of our log hauling during the summer months," Mr. Garrison informed me, "and cold deck the

logs at the mill, thus insuring a supply for continuous mill operations. Incidentally, this procedure should meet with the hearty endorsement of the county court—it will eliminate disastrous roadwear otherwise bound to occur, when heavy trucking is done during the rainy season." The mill at the present time is operating exclusively on government orders.

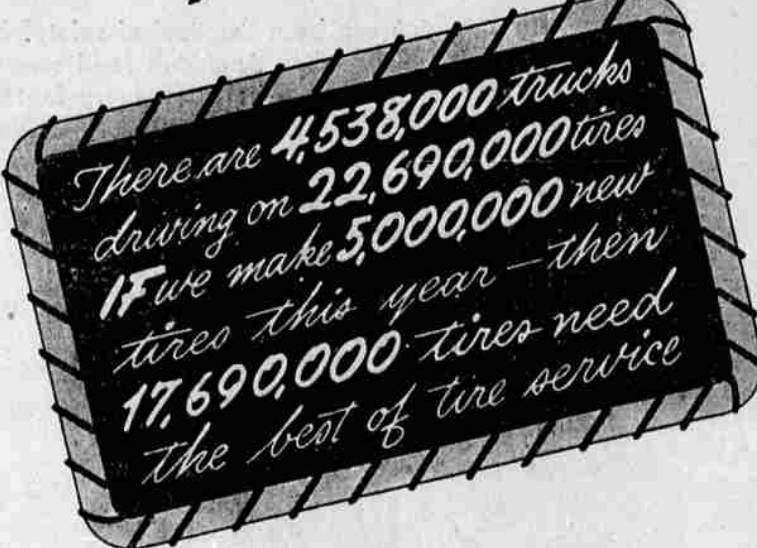


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
