Walter Hautzig made his American debut in Town Hall, New York, last fall, when his playing was declared by the New York Times "remarkable for its poetry and imagination, its inner life, spontaneity and insight." The pianist studied at the Curtis Institute of Music after escaping from his native Vienna after the Anschluss.

The young artist, who is 21 years of age, has received the acclaim of everyone hearing him. Leading newspapers throughout the United States have been generous in their praise of his ability as a truly great pianist.

Eisenhower Tells Fliers K. O. Task Lies Ahead

A U. S. FIGHTER BASE, England, April 11.—(AP)—Gen. Eisenhower told a group of American fighter pilots today that they soon would be flying from dawn to dusk in a great land, sea and air offensive of western Europe that would completely crush the Germans.

The supreme allied commander for the western front invasion said that he would demand of the pilots everything they have, that he would drive them so hard that they would have to forego proper food and sleep for weeks. But he declared emphatically that they would knock the Nazis out.

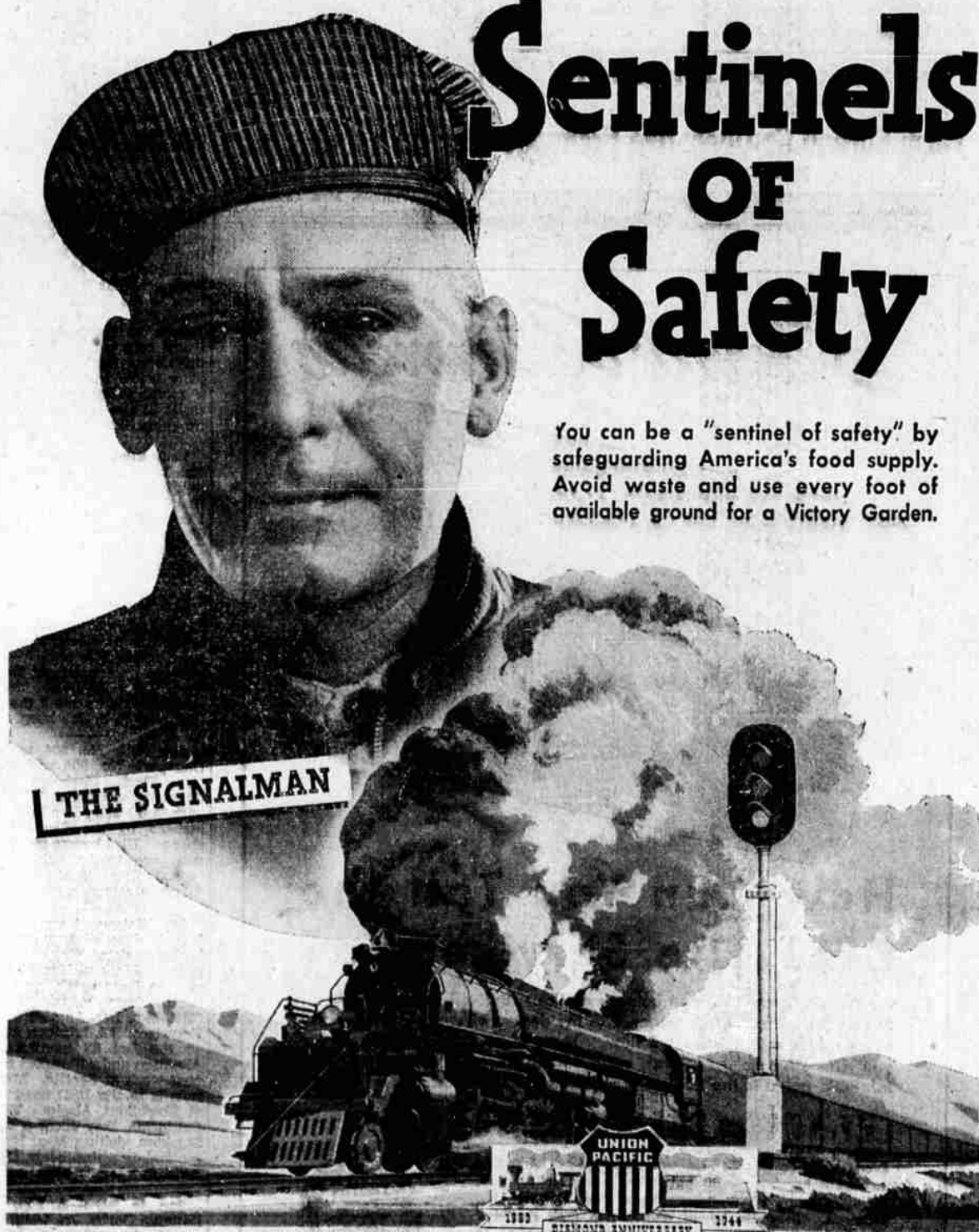
