## Nippons Attacking Imphal and Kohima, Stimson Advises

WASHINGTON, April 13.—(AP)—Secretary of War Stimson said today that Japanese troops had cut the road between Imphal and Kohima and "are attacking both towns."

He observed at the press conference where he made the disclosure that "it is not too difficult" for troops to penetrate in areas of the hills and jungles. A line of defense at Imphal, he said, could not be employed but it is possible in such fighting to retain certain strong points of defense. Thus far, he added, British and Indian troops are holding the strong points.

He said that "substantial reserves of men and weapons are available" in the area.

The war secretary, however, avoided predictions on the outcome by saying that "in the middle of a battle there is never anything to be gained by predictions—developing facts best speak for themselves."

More than 26,000 Japanese have been killed in fighting the Southwest and Central Pacific during recent months, Stimson said.

Stimson said these Japanese casualties were all counted dead and "do not include those who died of wounds and of disease behind the enemy lines or were given mass burial" by the Japanese before American forces penetrated former enemy areas. Likewise, the totals do not include those who died on ships and barges attacked by the allies or who met death in air raids on Japanese installations.

## Policy Toward Neutrals Aiding Nazis Tightened

LONDON, April 13.—(AP)—Britain and the United States toughened their policy toward neutrals today by tightening the Irish blockade with reduced steamship service, protesting against increased Turkish shipments of chrome to Germany and condemning the Spanish seizure of allied oil stocks in Spanish Morocco.

The ministry of war transport announced steamer service from Britain to Eire would be cut after April 24. This followed suspension of telephone service and virtual prohibition on travel permits.

Britain and the U. S. were both said by an authoritative informant to have made strong representations to Spain about oil and chrome to Turkey about chrome. The emphatic diplomatic language used followed closely the address by Secretary of State Hull in which he warned neutrals their continued dealings with the enemy could not be tolerated.

It was probable that similar notes would be dispatched dealing with Spanish and Portuguese shipments of wolfram and Swedish exports of ball bearings to Germany.
