Cordon's Taking Of Webster's Seat Stirs Controversy

WASHINGTON, April 12.—(AP)—A 97th seat in the senate may be the only solution for a hot controversy that has republicans in a dither.

It all started when Senator White of Maine became acting G. O. P. leader and moved to the front row, center, chair which had been held down by the late Senator McNary of Oregon.

White, as acting leader, wanted to keep his old desk too, because it once was occupied by Daniel Webster. Temporarily Senator Cordon of Oregon, who replaced McNary, has moved into the historic Webster seat.

This hasn't pleased some republicans who have seniority and who want to sit where Webster sat. They even have talked of having a 97th seat put in, where Cordon could carry on his duties, leaving Webster's place vacant until it is decided whether White will return to his old desk or keep the new.

The republicans are afraid, though, that it might take unanimous consent to put No. 97 in the line and some mischievous democrat would be almost certain to object.

Little Activity on Italian War Front

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Naples, April 13.—(AP)—German forces in the Garigliano sector southwest of Cassino have begun to assume a more aggressive spirit, reacting sharply to allied reconnaissance.

There are indications that the nazis are continuing to regroup the forces which were observed there last week and German engineers seem to be mining the Garigliano river.

Yesterday there were a number of minor patrol clashes on the Adriatic sector and the Germans made attacks on several houses southwest of Crecchio, but the front generally remained quiet.

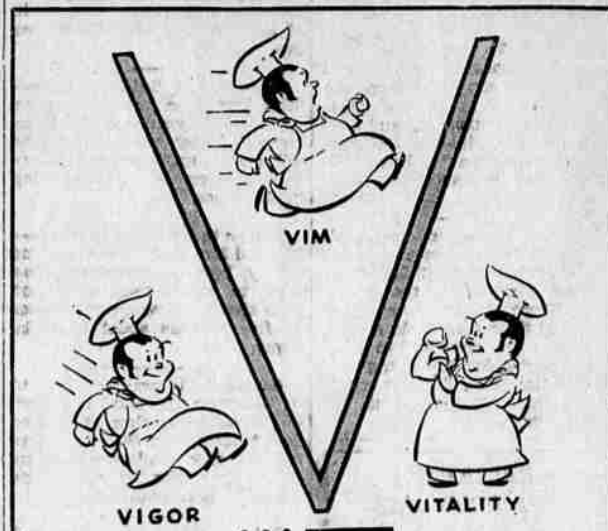
Enemy trucks moving up to Cassino along the highway six miles south of the town were shelled by allied artillery. There
