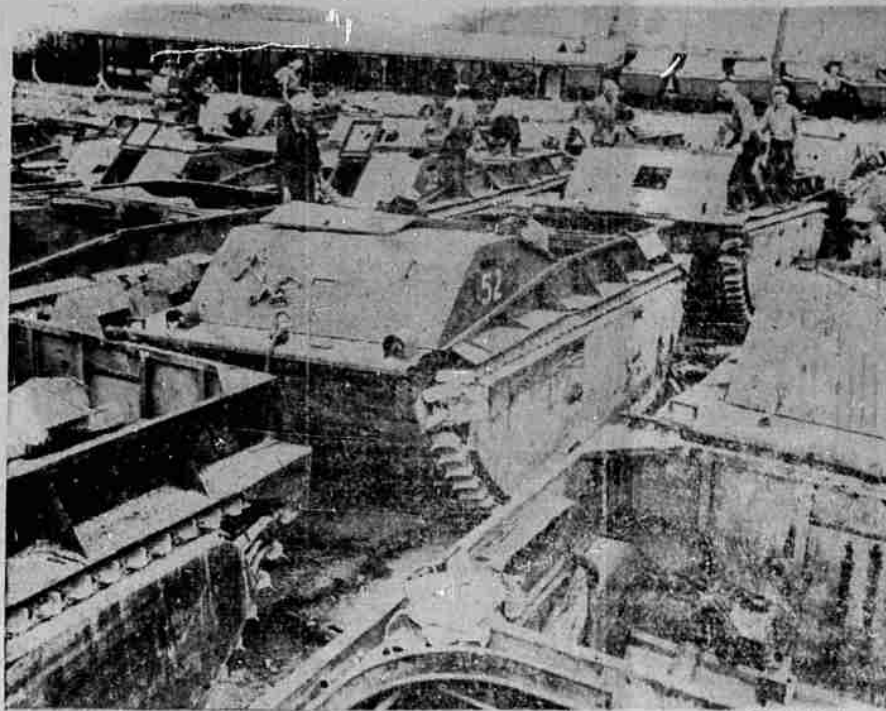

War Secretary Job Suggested for General M'Arthur

WASHINGTON, April 14 — (AP)—The appointment of Gen. Douglas MacArthur as secretary of war was proposed by a republican and a democratic senator today as politicians calculated the effect of correspondence which most of them interpreted as indicating MacArthur is receptive to a GOP presidential nomination.

Chiefly by what he left unsaid in an exchange of letters just made public by Rep. Miller (R., Neb.), MacArthur apparently left the way open for a draft movement, and heartened supporters declared they would canvass convention delegates in an effort to persuade them to nominate the general.

Replying to suggestions by Miller that he hold himself ready for a nomination with which the Nebraska predicted MacArthur could carry every state, the general wrote that he did not anticipate fulfillment of these "flattering predictions." He did not say he would not accept such a nomination.

MacArthur expressed interest in Miller's critical appraisal of home front conditions and warned against letting the nation "slip into the same condition internally as the one which we fight externally."

Too Late, Some Believe

Practical politicians took this to mean that MacArthur would be willing to run. But some of those not classed among his enthusiasts thought this word had come too late to overcome the lead Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York has acquired in an equally unauthorized scramble for convention delegates. The draft movement thus far has given MacArthur only three, as against 148 pledged and claimed for Dewey. (Needed to nominate: 530).

Most congressional democrats were critical of MacArthur's attitude, as expressed in his letters to Miller, but Senator Chavez (D., N.M.) said he thought his party ought to bring the general home immediately as war secretary.

Senator Bridges (R., N.H.), a member of the military committee, said a remark in one of MacArthur's letters raised the question whether the southwest Pacific area yet is receiving adequate military supplies and men. The general observed that "we are doing what we can with what we have" but added the hope that "more substantial forces" would be placed at his disposal soon.

Criticism was voiced by Senator Tamm (D., Del.) of another passage in which MacArthur called "sobering" Miller's analysis of what the house member said were new deal "mistakes" on the home front. MacArthur urged that the people be given "the real facts."

"I'd like to know what either he or Dewey is doing to bring before the people the real facts," Tamm said. "If the people have to depend on the republican candidates to bring before them the real facts, they will never know what the facts are until they have made another mistake such as that of electing Harding in 1920."

Aleutians Angling Good, Storms Bad, Lt. Bellows Says

The Aleutian islands are poor places in which to fight a war but they are unexcelled for fishing, according to First Lieutenant Robert W. Bellows, staff officer of the infantry regiment which was the first to land in the island area. Lieutenant Bellows has survived home to spend a 20-day leave with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy E. Bellows, after two years and four months spent on Unimak island.

Streams on Unimak are very narrow, deep and swift, Lieutenant Bellows reports, but trout can be caught as rapidly as they can be taken off the hook. They will hit a small spinner, but will take no other lure.

The regiment with which Lieutenant Bellows is serving holds the highest presidential citation for the service it has given.

Following his leave here, he will report to an army post in Mississippi for new assignment. Particularly outstanding experiences with Aleutian weather, Bellows states, centered around the willows, the sudden windstorms of intense velocity, changing directions frequently. On last Christmas day, he reports, he left the mess hall and by mistake followed a guide wire which led to the barracks of a neighboring company. The guide wires, he reports, were placed so men could find their way in the sudden storms. The wind and snow were driving so fiercely he was unable to return to his own company, and was forced to spend

the night with the neighboring unit.
