STORAGE IS MAJOR PROBLEM

With cold storage facilities throughout the country packed to near capacity, the War Food administration and cooperating agencies are taking steps whenever possible to ease the space scarcity. Heavy slaughtering of hogs during the winter and current flush production of eggs plus a reduction in shipments overseas are reported chiefly responsible for the storage troubles. Holdings in cold storage on March 1 were substantially heavier than a year ago, with biggest increases in lard and rendered pork fat, butter, poultry, frozen vegetables, frozen eggs and meat.
