Fair Grounds Plan Given Support by 40 et 8 Voiture

Endorsement of the county fair grounds proposal which will appear on the primary election ballot was given by Voiture No. 1221 of the 40 et 8, which held its regular monthly promenade last week at the home of Voyageur Ted Post, who entertained the group with a spaghetti feed following a short business session. The Roseburg voiture was recently organized with its jurisdiction embracing all five American Legion posts in Douglas county. Local officers recently were installed by John Graham of Toledo, Oregon. The charter, signed by 18 of the 20 charter members, was presented at a promenade held April 11.

Chef de Gare George Trapalls has announced the appointment of Carl E. Wimberly as judge advocate; Ted Post, historian, and L. J. Crafton, publicity officer. Richard L. Preston and C. B. Calkins were accepted into membership.

The decision to endorse the fair grounds proposal was unanimously made following a brief talk by Voyageur Sig Felt, who outlined the program initiated by the members of the Douglas County Mounted Police. The voiture also decided to assist in sponsoring advertising and publicity favoring the organization should sponsor the attendance of one boy at the Beaver Boy State, the American Legion citizenship summer school. Voyageur George Averett, a visitor from Salem, was a speaker, outlining the activities of the Salem unit.

A lengthy discussion was held relative to voter registration and the voiture voted to aid in securing voter registration.

The next regular meeting will be held May 9 at the Sig Felt home, where refreshments will be served by Fred Wenger.

IS "COXEY" PREVENTABLE?

There are dozens of products on the market for the control and prevention of coxidia. Many are absolutely worthless, and a number of them do a fair job in controlling the "bloody" (tenella) type. Some official experiments prove that under certain conditions, sulphur does prevent this type of coxey.

It must be remembered, however, that there are at least seven types of coxey, and that in the long run, some of them are much more costly to the poultryman than the more flashy tenella type. So it is possible we might prevent this type of coxey, and still have trouble.

It is agreed by all authorities nowadays that it is better for chicks to have a mild case of coxey than to prevent it completely by sanitation or medication. The reason: light attacks of coxey builds up resistance, or even immunity, which seems better than to have to worry about it all the time. In addition, absolute prevention, while possible by sanitation, (though not likely by medication), is far from practical, due to the prevalence of the "germ".

The ideal then, is for the chick to have light attacks of coxey, but to prevent heavy attacks. One day a week on loten mash, goes far towards this ideal. In nearly all cases it has prevented a heavy and highly fatal attack, because loten destroys the germ in the bird's body, thereby giving the bird a fresh start every week.

Also, believe it or not, keeping the grain hoppers full, at least from 4 p. m. to 9 a. m., goes a long ways towards keeping coxey under control. Poultry scientists believe this is due to the slower rate at which the organism reaches the bird's testicles, when the crop and gizzard are full of grain. Also, if birds have plenty to eat, and

GET NEXT YEAR'S TOMS NOW

Every fall there is a mad rush to find turkey gobblers to mate up breeding flocks for the coming egg season. Nearly always somebody gets disappointed in quality, and too many times diseases have been introduced into flocks previously clean.

The best way and the cheapest way to get your toms for next year is to buy eggs from some good, clean flock, or day old poults. Brood these right along with your own poults, have them toe marked, and next fall you will have one less worry, a lot less expense, and the assurance that your breeding flock will have no new disease brought to them by way of new toms.

If you like big turkeys, get eggs or poults from some grower who has that kind. We consider it a big mistake to get small toms, and then expect big results. There are plenty of good flocks in Douglas County, so it is not necessary to go far from home.

TURKEY FAT PELLETS

The turkey hatching egg deal seems to be pinching out pretty fast. It isn't too late now to get a little better weight and finish on your breeders before marketing. We suggest that you "warm them up" a little, by feeding Umpqua Turkey Fat for ten days or two weeks before sending them to the killing plant.

OPTIMISM JUSTIFIED

Couple weeks ago we said the OPA MIGHT get scared about a shortage of fried chicken and boost the price of fryers. Well, they did boost the ceiling on broilers, up to 2 1/2 lbs. up to 33¢ a lb. Now if they would boost the ceiling on all young chickens a nickel the demand for hatching eggs would boom. That would mean less commercial eggs, and would help relieve the critical condition of that market, which in turn would stimulate orders for laying pullets, and oh, boy.

Some of the largest California hatcheries are confidently predicting that hatching eggs will be far short of needs from July 1st on through the winter. And several U. S. Senators have gone to the W. F. A. complaining of the egg situation in general, and expressing the fear that eggs will be so scarce next fall the price will reach as high as \$1.25 per dozen. (Of course, you nor we are that dumb.)
