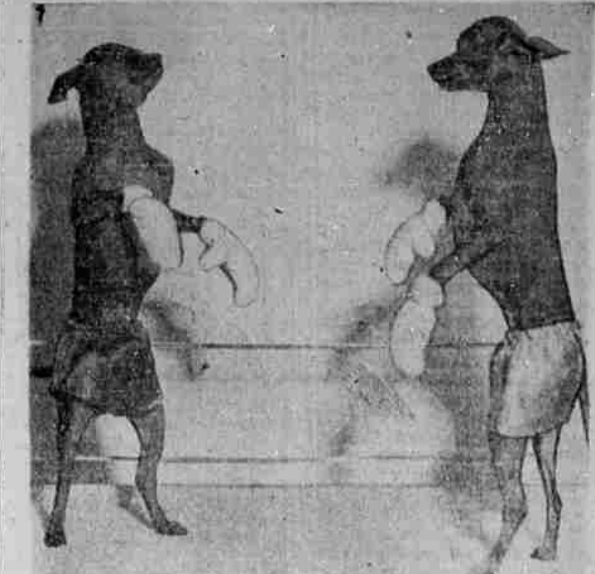

**G. O. P. Senators Assail Bone for Not Resigning**

WASHINGTON, April 18 — (AP)—Senator Bone (D-Wash.), under republican fire for retaining his senate seat after being confirmed as a federal judge, said today his plans are "yet to be determined."

Acting Minority Leader White (R-Maine) has disclosed that senate republicans are considering lodging a formal protest against Bone's failure to resign from the senate. Bone was nominated by President Roosevelt two weeks ago to the ninth circuit court bench, and confirmed the same day by his senate colleagues. His resignation would open the way for appointment of a republican successor by Governor Langlie.

He was a veteran of the Spanish-American war and for a number of years was adjutant of the George Starmer camp, U. S. W. V.

The body has been removed to the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors. Funeral arrangements are being delayed pending news on the time of arrival of the brother and sister, who are en route to Roseburg.

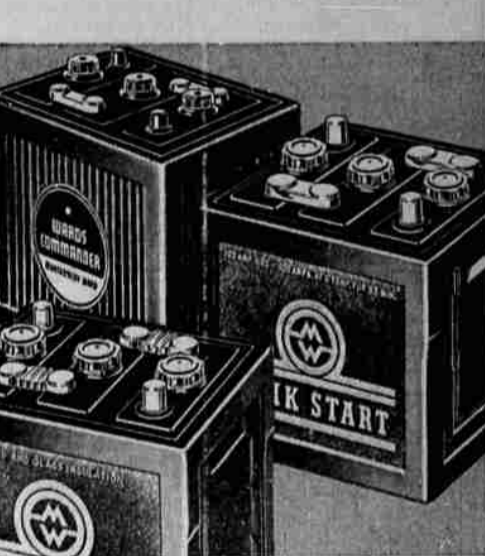
