Registration for May Primary Completed

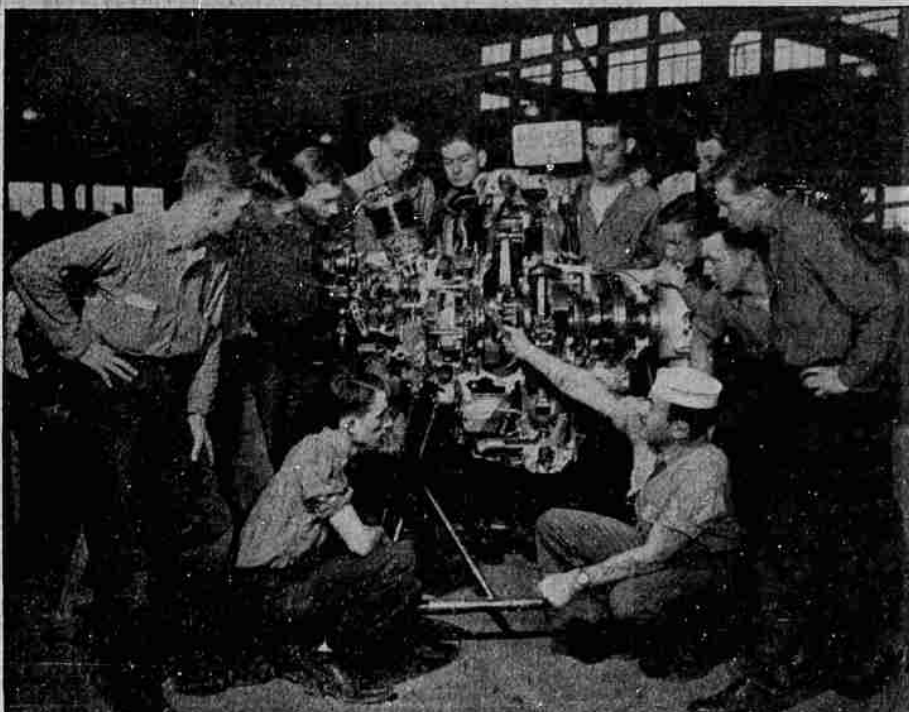

ed self-propelled barges and transports trying to slip out of the battered harbor under cover of darkness.

In the western Ukraine, meanwhile, the Germans were reported to have thrown large numbers of tanks and infantry into a fresh assault east of Stanislaw seeking to hold back the red army's advance on the big communications hub of Lwow. The soviet communiqué said the nazis suffered heavy losses in 15 unsuccessful attacks.

The communiqué said many fires were started Monday night

in a mass raid by long-range soviet bombers against the Romanian rail hub and seaport of Constanta, an attack which dovetailed with allied air blows against the Balkans from Italy.
