ONE HALF (I think it is one half, this is just one uninformed commentator's guess) of the Sutherland mill. It was tied to the bank of the log pond at the Sutherland mill of the Springfield Plywood company. The other half of the navy (refer parenthesis above) cruises the rippling pond of the Sutherland Timber Products company, within whistling distance.

The ship was moored entirely exposed, with no camouflage whatever, which in itself attests to the feeling of security which its commander felt, in home

waters. Without knowing for sure, I imagine however that adequate precautions have been taken for its protection, in case of an air offensive, or any other kind.

The dreadnaught is 22 feet long, weighs three tons, is powered with a 120 h. p. engine Packard motor and is capable of pulling a log raft composed about 125,000 board feet. Indeed, that is its function: Moving selected logs from one portion of the big pond, to another.

Logs from the company's extensive timber holdings east of

Sutherland are dumped promiscuously into the pond. Then those of finer quality are retrieved, loaded on railroad flats and sent to Springfield to be manufactured into plywood. The rest are sawed and planed into lumber at the Sutherland mill.

Standing (half-reclining) on the bridge of the craft are Lionel Schetke, at the left, superintendent of the mill; and Virgil Wridge, pond foreman.

Keeping this ship's log (or logs) is a much more difficult matter than that of the average, or usual seagoing vessel.
