

Oregon Christian Endeavor Meeting To Open Tonight

The Oregon State Christian Endeavor convention is scheduled to open in Roseburg tonight, with delegates in attendance from all parts of the state. Officers of the state society arrived this morning to complete the pre-convention arrangements.

Registration started at 11 a. m. today, with the formal convention program scheduled to open at 7:30 p. m. The principal address tonight will be by Rev. Mark Koehler of Spokane, professor of religious education at Whitworth college.

Lions See Films Of War Duty, Hear Of Help to Blind

Captain Coleman of Roseburg and Adjutant Thomas of Eugene, members of the Salvation Army, last night presented a technicolor motion picture film to the members of the Roseburg Lions club at their regular dinner meeting in the Umpqua hotel.

The film depicted services performed in all parts of the world by the Salvation Army.

Colonel Stewart Arnold of the Tillamook Lions club and his "seeing-eye" dog, "Mac," was introduced to the club and told of the work he was doing in Oregon training dogs for blind veterans of World war II.

Colonel Arnold, who lost the sight of his eyes in World war I, informed members that 84 blind soldiers have already returned from the current war to Oregon and that many more veterans will be returning in the near future.

The colonel, with the aid of his dog, has travelled all over the U. S. and has flown some 13,000 miles in connection with his work of training dogs and aiding other blind persons.

Noted Polo Player Killed in Crash

NEW YORK, April 20.—(AP)—Lieut. Col. Thomas (Tommy) Hitchcock, Jr., 44, internationally famous as one of the greatest polo players of all time, has been killed in an airplane crash in England where he commanded a P-51 Mustang fighter group.

Death of the polo star, who had served in World war I as the youngest member of the Lafayette escadrille, was disclosed by his family.

Unable to enlist in the U. S. army in World war I because he was only 17, Hitchcock joined the famous 137th, which shot down two enemy planes and fought brilliantly until he was downed himself behind the German lines.

Although wounded with a bullet in the thigh, he escaped and made his way to Switzerland. Later he returned to the United States, was graduated from Harvard. He then began making polo history.

Giants, Browns Top Major Leagues by Winning First Two

The New York Giants and the St. Louis Browns are hiding up on top of the major leagues.

Excellent pitching efforts by Ewald Pyle and Bill Voiselle of the Giants, and Steve Sundra and Jack Kramer of the Browns, make them the only unbeaten teams who have won two starts.

It took a boost from the boss in the form of Mel Ott's 464th major league home run to put over Pyle's bid for his first National league victory. Ott's clout gave the New Yorkers their 2-1 edge on Boston.

Sundra gave the Browns their second in a row with a three-hit effort against Detroit. The Tigers, beaten 3-1, had only Rudy York's homer to thank for missing a shutout. It was York's 1000th big league hit.

The New York Yankees ran into trouble when two promising rookies, Johnny Johnson and Walt Dubiel, were beaten as the champs dropped both ends of a patriots' day doubleheader in Boston, 6-1 and 5-2.

Orval Grove got the Chicago White Sox off on the right foot with a 3-1 verdict over the Cleveland Indians in a delayed opening game.

Aussie Premier In U. S. To Confer With Roosevelt

SAN FRANCISCO, April 20.—(AP)—Australia's Prime Minister John Curtin and his party of 16 military and diplomatic aides were en route today to Washington for conferences with President Roosevelt.

Curtin stressed that Japanese mandated islands should never be allowed to become "potential bases of strength to an enemy." Australia looks, he said, to the U. S. and her allies to prevent world peace from being disturbed again by aggressors.

The prime minister declined comment on the current censorship controversy in Australia, between the government and leading newspapers, because of the contempt of court restrictions under dominion law. He said, however, he is opposed to censorship of political opinion and news "un-

less security makes censorship necessary."

In reference to withdrawal of thousands of Aussie troops for homeland food production, Curtin said "we are reallocating because of a reassessment of the war, without lessening our combat ability."

New Schedule of Greyhound Buses Affects Roseburg

A new schedule was placed in effect by the Pacific Greyhound lines today, affecting all buses operating through Roseburg. Time was advanced on nearly all schedules to meet the summer travel demands.

Under the new time table, buses northbound will leave Roseburg at 3:30 a. m., 9:58 a. m., 2:15 p. m., 5:35 p. m. and 11:10 p. m.

Buses southbound will leave

at 2:10 a. m., 7:10 a. m., 2:10 p. m., 6:45 p. m., and 9:05 p. m.

Westbound buses to Coos Bay provide one schedule daily, arriving at 1:40 p. m. and leaving at 2:15 p. m.

The early afternoon leaving

time brings about a severe congestion at the Roseburg terminal, as the southbound buses leave at 2:10 and the northbound and westbound at 2:15, which will place from eight to 10 cars in the terminal simultaneously.

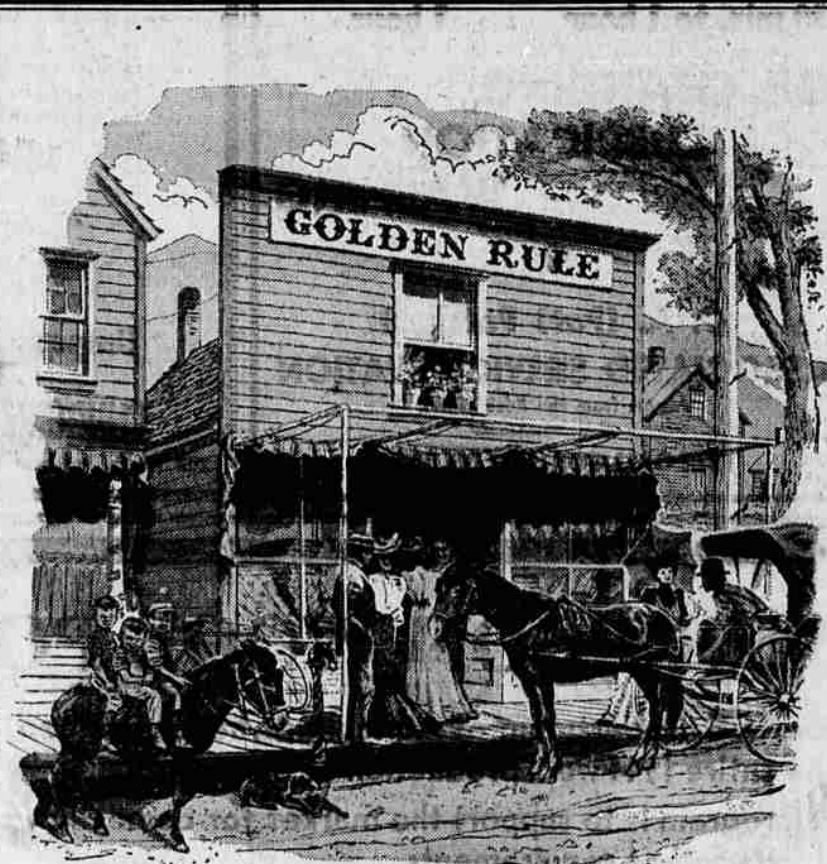
