Klamath Farmers Ask Relief From Wildfowl Raiding

KLAMATH FALLS, April 24.—(AP)—Federal aid in preventing repetition of last year's crop losses from wildfowl depredations, estimated at from \$150,000 to \$300,000, has been asked by farmers of this area.

Through the Klamath county agricultural postwar planning committee they have asked the federal fish and wildlife service to:

Plant wildlife service lands to grain to provide feed for ducks and geese; extend the hunting season to run from October 1 to December 1; increase the bag limit to five geese and 25 ducks; permit hunting from daylight to dark and obtain more ammunition for hunters.

Farmers, who tried vainly to scare away the wildfowl last fall with low flying airplanes, report thousands of ducks and geese now are in newly seeded fields, stripping them of alfalfa pea and clover sprouts.

A closed season on does in the Klamath-Lake area this year will be sought from the state game commission by the Isaac Walton League's Klamath-Moore chapter, officials said today.

PORTLAND, April 24.—(AP)—In a move to ease Oregon's critical shortage of heavy construction equipment, War Production board officials today called for registration of all available machinery.

Edward L. Kropp, Oregon WPP construction machinery division chief, said 90 per cent of such machinery is being used by the armed forces. The current drive is for machinery for civilian use, he said.
