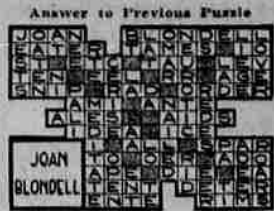

Fighter Reported Dead Reappears On Boxing Slate

PORTLAND, April 27.—(AP)—Jimmy Liddell came back from the grave to fight a national boxing club main event with Eddie Weller here tomorrow.

It's Jimmy's first fight since he was given up for dead by family, fans, fellow-gladiators and the War department.

The colored lad, protege of Henry Armstrong, was listed as a Guadalcanal casualty back in 1942. In the Los Angeles big Olympic arena, fans stood in silent salute as the timekeeper tolled the ten notes on the arena bell that are boxing's traditional farewell to a fallen gladiator.

But Jimmy, 24-year-old lad who had marked up 96 professional fights before he entered the army, wasn't dead. He was merely suffering from malaria and a Japanese machine-gun bullet a half-inch below the heart.

He doesn't know why he was reported dead. Maybe the doctors thought he was about to be.

But after 21 days in a coma, he sat up; was moved to New Zealand; then back to San Francisco. There the Red Cross paid for a phone call to his home.

Jimmy's family wouldn't believe it. Some kind of cruel joke. They shouted into the ether end of the line. Confusion was so great that Jimmy finally yelled, "I'll come down there and prove it," and hung up.

Which he did. Then, with the Purple Heart and a medical discharge, he went to work as an electrician's helper in a Portland shipyard. Tomorrow will be his first return to the ring since he got back from the grave and Guadalcanal.

The nazi-controlled Paris radio declared that Paris had been under attack for more than an hour and said the raid "cost the lives of many Frenchmen." The RAF has been hitting steadily at prime rail targets in this sector.

Nazis Strike Back

A number of persons were killed last night when a German raider's high explosive bomb hit the underground shelter in which about 60 adults and children had sought haven at a south coast town.

Bombs fell in a tenement district, smashing a mission hall and several taverns. The town cannot be named. The German radio said Portsmouth was subjected to a sharp attack.

Funeral services for Lieutenant Richard Jay Young, above, killed Sunday in the crash of his airplane near El Cajon, California, will be held Saturday at 2:30 p. m. at the First Presbyterian church in Roseburg. The body will arrive in Eugene early Friday morning, accompanied by a military escort, and will be brought to Roseburg by the Roseburg Undertaking company.

The service will be conducted by Dr. Morris H. Roach and will be concluded in the Masonic cemetery.

Lieutenant Young, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Young, Roseburg, was born Oct. 16, 1922, in Santa Barbara, Calif. He attended school at Claremont, California, and Roseburg, being graduated from Roseburg high school with the class of 1940, later attending Chaffey Junior college at Ontario, California. He enlisted in the Marine corps in 1942.

He was married in August, 1943, to Miss Patricia Quinn, daughter of Mrs. E. S. Woodford, Salem. Surviving are his wife; his parents, and two brothers.

Mrs. Young is en route to Roseburg accompanied by Mrs. J. D. Johnson, sister-in-law of Mrs. J. E. Young, and Mrs. Robert Moore, wife of Lieutenant Moore, a close friend of Lieutenant Young and commanding officer of the military escort. Mrs. Young and her friends are expected to arrive this afternoon, coming from Claremont, California.

Axis Supply Ships Sunk By Allies Near Corsica

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Naples, April 27.—(AP)—Allied troops repulsed two minor German attacks in the Adriatic sector of the Italian front yesterday as bad weather limited air operations to a few routine patrols, allied headquarters announced today.

Allied naval forces, meanwhile, were credited with sinking four small enemy supply ships, three lighters and a tug in the Ligurian sea north of Corsica Monday night, the communique said. Prisoners were taken.

The allied forces suffered neither damage nor casualties, headquarters declared.

The same night two enemy destroyers were reported damaged and a corvette sunk when attacked by U. S. naval craft and allied planes.

Kuriles Receive Another Bombing

AN ALEUTIAN BASE, Alaska, April 26.—(delayed)—(AP)—The first daylight mission against the Japanese Kuriles island since last September 11 was announced by the Eleventh air force today.

The bold venture into the sky over the Japanese homeland came as nighttime "Empire Express" bombing and reconnaissance raids also were resumed on April 24.

Second Lt. Victor Babkiewicz of Springfield, Vt., led the daylight reconnaissance mission by Liberator bombers which scanned the Kuriles from Paramushiro to Matsuwa. They encountered no opposition either from the land or air.

Babkiewicz reported he was unable to find any bomb targets on Onkotan, Shasukotan or other small islands between Paramushiro and Matsuwa. The latter two, over which the reconnaissance group did not fly, are known sites of numerous army and navy air bases.

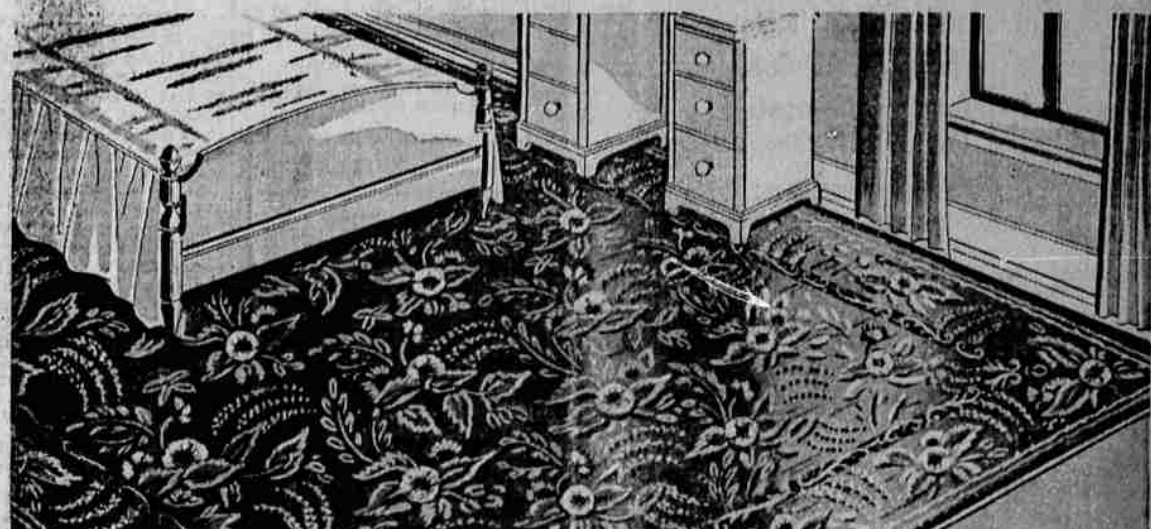
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
