BARBARA PICHETTE HONORED ON BIRTHDAY

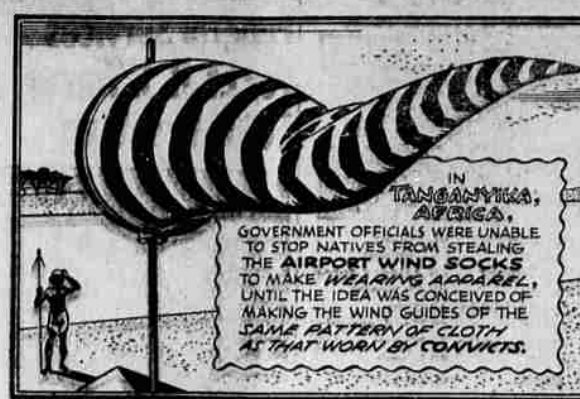
