

Yeager and Moran Tell Lions Club of Wartime Phases

Master Sergeant Bruce Yeager of the U. S. marines, stationed with the ordnance department, tank division, at San Francisco, and Sgt. James Moran, formerly of company D of the local national guard unit, were guest speakers at the Roseburg Lions club at their dinner meeting at the Umpqua hotel last night.

Yeager explained how mechanics received their training in service and how tanks and other mechanical equipment were prepared for shipment overseas. He explained that even tanks had to be oiled and done up in air-tight crates and wrappings to protect them from rust and damage.

Sergeant James Moran, who sent four and one-half months as topographical draftsman in New Guinea, told of his experiences there and in Australia, New Zealand and the Society Islands. He pointed out the extent to which sulfa drugs were used by the army in the South seas because the temperature even at sea level remained around 110 de-

grees and slight wounds required immediate attention to prevent infection. He also answered club members questions concerning other former members of company D, including George Sanders, William Rutter, Lawrence Hill and Elmer Hill and Sandy McDonald.

Earl Allen, west coast lumber inspector, was introduced to the club by Lion J. P. Motschenbacher as a new member.

2 Ship Collisions Occur On Lake Erie; Ten Dead

CLEVELAND, April 27—(AP)—Two ship collisions occurred in a heavy fog which swept over Lake Erie at dawn today, resulting in the loss of ten seamen and two lake freight carriers.

The James H. Reed, operated by Pickands Mather lines for the Interlake Steamship Co., of Cleveland, sank about 40 miles north of Erie, Pa., after colliding with the steamer Ashcroft, operated by Canadian Steamship Line, Ltd., of Montreal.

Ten crewmen from the Reed were feared lost, and 26 survivors were taken aboard the Ashcroft which headed for Erie.

The Columbia Transit Co.'s steamer Frank Vigor was reported sunk in Pelee passage of western Lake Erie at about the same time, after colliding with the steamer Phillip Minch, owned by the Kinsman Transit Co.

All members of the Vigor's crew were transferred to the Minch and there were no injured, the coast guard reported.

Negros Freed Here After Minor Penalties Fixed

Three negroes, Grover T. Kelley, Andrew Clay and Ed Williams, who had been held at Roseburg for investigation following their arrest Sunday by state police when they were found driving an automobile with extra gasoline tanks, while the occupants held extra ration tickets and carried a sawed-off shotgun, were released from custody late Wednesday. Investigation failed to reveal any previous criminal record. The FBI and OPA were notified of the possession of ration coupons but placed no hold order on the men, it was stated. Williams paid a fine of \$10 for operating an automobile without a driver's license. The other two pleaded guilty to vagrancy and 30-day jail sentences were suspended.

Highway Engineers Eye 2nd Avenue South Status

R. H. Baldock, state highway department engineer, and C. B. McCulloch, assistant engineer, were in Roseburg today conferring with city officials and making an inspection of the traffic situation at Second Avenue South.
