## Nazis Bomb Invasion Vessels in British Harbors as Foreign Sources Indulge in Guessing on Date of Second Front Lunge

LONDON, April 28 (AP)—Masses of allied invasion vessels, assembling in the harbors of western England, were attacked by German bombers last night, Berlin dispatches by way of Stockholm said today.

The German communique asserted that German motor torpedo boats sank three British ships totalling 9,100 tons in an attack on a convoy off the south coast of England this morning, and that the German air force's attacks against shipping concentrations off the British southwest coast last night were effective.

Nazis and neutrals, continuing a guessing game that began several weeks ago, said the invasion might be less than two weeks away, and Berlin dispatches to Stockholm said great quantities of allied shipping were gathered in the channel ports of southeastern England as well as western England.

German authorities in Holland were reported to be preparing to blast the great dykes which guard the entrance to the Zuider Zee and flood a huge area including Rotterdam and Amsterdam.

Britain's shores were closed today to all except the most urgent outbound civilian travel under new regulations designed to keep invasion plans secret.

The new travel restrictions, effective last midnight, supplemented others previously in force. One earlier decree had banned travel between Britain and Ireland. Another keeps diplomats of all countries except the United States, Russian and the British commonwealth within

Britain for the time being.

**Guessing on Invasion**  
Joining the Germans in the invasion-guessing game, Capt. Karl Falkman, a Swedish naval commentator, expressed the view this morning that the assault may come in broad daylight some time between May 2 and May 17.

The Berlin correspondent of the Swiss newspaper Die Tat said foreign newspapermen in the German capital were betting on the attack to take place between May 6 and June 7. In Ankara a Turkish commentator put it, his word, declaring: "We can take it for granted the next few days or weeks will witness the most important development of the war."

A Moscow dispatch said the Russian newspaper Pravda observed that "conditions are favorable now for powerful blows not only from the east but the south and west."

In a Swedish broadcast Falkman declared that because of the supremacy the allies possess both at sea and in the air it would not be necessary for them to strike at night. Along with an amphibious attack, he said, great numbers of parachute troops may drop behind the German lines.

A dispatch from Bern, Switzerland, said the German newspaper Das Reich had admitted that some 15,000,000 foreign workers within Germany are "longing for our (Germany's) defeat." Zurich's Die Tat said some of these workers had been detected building smoking fires in factory chimneys to attract the attention of allied fliers.

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## Recreational Opportunities Of Roseburg Stressed

Organized Program Needed, Federal Service Agent Says After Survey of Facilities

The city of Roseburg has exceptional facilities for recreational purposes but needs an organized program for utilization, Miss Gladys M. Everett, of War Public Services, Federal Works agency, declared here today. Miss Everett has been conducting a survey of park and playground facilities while working with chamber of commerce officers in outlining a program for both juvenile and adult recreation.

"I am surprised," she declared today, "that you have so much equipment and so many beautiful spots for development as parks and playgrounds and yet are making so little use of those things you already have at hand."

She is urging a carefully coordinated program to be worked out between the city council and the board of school directors, whereby school facilities shall be made available to the community for "extended education and recreation."

### Development Urged

The schools' athletic fields, tennis courts, workshops, gymnasiums, etc., should be made available for general use outside of school hours, she states, while, at the same time, the city should develop rest parks and playgrounds, equipped with slides, swings, wading pools and other facilities. Miss Everett urges the development of a modest program, which may be gradually expanded, taking advantage of all available sites and equipment to be used cooperatively.

She is assisting in outlining the general policies to be used in

formulating a program. A specific outline is later to be prepared, following conferences between various agencies, and after costs are determined, she will entertain applications for federal grants to be used for equipment, leadership, etc.

Roger Folgate, recreation supervisor of the Federal Security agency, also was in Roseburg last night and today, making a detailed study of gymnasium, athletic field and other specific existing facilities.

Federal funds are available, it is stated, to aid communities where population has been increased by essential war industry, and it is believed Roseburg can qualify for such aid.

To assist in outlining the proposed recreational program, Mayor W. F. Harris, at the request of the chamber of commerce, has appointed a special committee consisting of Percy Croft and Charles Wharton, as members of the council; H. H. (Hod) Turner, high school athletic coach; Kenneth Ford, Roseburg Lumber company; Rev. Len R. Fishback; Vernon M. Orr, and Harold J. Hickerson. This committee will act as advisory to the city council in working out the suggested recreational program.
