PROCESSED FOODS
BOOK 4—Blue stamps, A8 through K8, valid indefinitely. Blue stamps L8 through Q8, valid indefinitely, beginning May 1.

MEAT, BUTTER, FATS AND CHEESE
BOOK 4—Red stamps A8 through K8 valid indefinitely. Red stamps R8, S8, T8 valid indefinitely beginning May 7.

Red stamps U8, V8, W8 valid indefinitely beginning May 21.

SUGAR
BOOK 4: Sugar stamp 30 valid for 5 pounds indefinitely. Sugar stamp 31 valid for 5 pounds indefinitely beginning April 1.

FOR CANNING ONLY: Sugar stamp 40 valid for 5 pounds through Feb. 28, 1945. Apply at local OPA board for more.

SHOES—Loose Stamps invalid. BOOK 1—Stamp 18 expires April 30.

BOOK 3—Airplane stamp No. 1 valid indefinitely, (new stamp to become valid May 1).

GASOLINE COUPONS—Not Valid Unless Endorsed. JUNE 21—Expiration date of No. 11 "A" coupons. (May renew B or C coupons within but not before 15 days from date on cover).

FUEL OIL
SEPTEMBER 20—Expiration date of period 4 and 5 coupons.

STOVES
Purchasers must get certificates at ration boards for most new stoves.

WOOD, SAWDUST, COAL
Fuel dealers deliver by priorities based on needs.

Coupons must be endorsed as soon as received—your protection against the black market.

PRICE CONTROL
Refer price inquiries and complaints to the price clerk of your local war price and rationing board.

TIRE INSPECTION
Tire inspection no longer required, but tire inspection records are needed to get special gasoline allotments, tire replacements, etc.

GNAWING AT NATIONAL EFFICIENCY
North of the border, according to the American Business Men's Research Foundation of Chicago, Americans recognize the liquor traffic to be a cause of absenteeism, accidents, social unrest, a waste of raw material, and a cause of crime. The Canadian government has boldly taken the stand that the less drinking Canada does, the better will be its war effort. This is not a moral or a religious move; it is simply a tremendously successful economic and war time treatment of the age old problem. The Canadian Government through its leader, Premier King, advocates temperance, it limits saloons to eight hours a day; it forbids all liquor advertising by radio, movies, newspapers and magazines. Its governmental policy is to decrease during war time the use of intoxicating liquor.

South of the border, the Government of the United States has issued no warning statement against the use of liquor. Saloons stay open from 16 to 20 hours a day; liquor advertising is unlimited; the strength of the drink is unlimited; restrictions on ordinary business are sometimes softened (for a while at least) for the brewer and the distiller, and this kindly attitude of Uncle Sam is neither a moral, a social or an economic move. No word of justification can be found for it. And a horde of rats are gnawing at our national efficiency. (Pd. Adv.)
