S. C. funds for experimental work. 8 Stabilization of weight laws on trucking to compare with surrounding states.

E. G. Cloake, legislative member, reviewed the charges in postal rates and pointed out that air mail going to armed forces overseas must have full postage prepaid or delivery cannot be made. Rates for airmail are 6 cents for one-half ounce.

Fuller's Division In Lots of Action

WITH THE AMERICAN SUNSET DIVISION AT HOLLANDIA, April 29 (AP)—You'll have to search a long way to find a more experienced division than this one.

Men of the fighting forty-first (Sunset) division on this beach now, have faced the Japanese at Samaranda, Nasua bay and Salamaua. One regiment has been in action for 76 consecutive days, which is a record for this war.

The veterans have been overseas since March 16, 1942. They were drawn originally from national guard units in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Wyoming and Montana. Although four regiments won battle streamers in World War one, the forty-first did not fight then as a division.

Its commander is dapper, little Maj. Gen. Horace Fuller, who commanded an artillery outfit in the last war and was given the Belgian and French Legion-of-Honor awards.
