Mrs. Cynthia Imhoff Turpin, 82, resident of Yoncalla for 50 years, passed away Friday at her home in Scotts Valley, near Yoncalla, after a short illness. She was born in Atchinson county, Missouri, April 12, 1862, daughter

Oregon Drinkers Allowed Extra Whiskey in May

PORTLAND, April 29.—(AP)—A "dividend" of one fifth of bourbon whiskey to Oregon drinkers in May was declared by the Oregon liquor control commission today.

Thus, according to the commission announcement, each permit holder will be allowed to purchase, in addition to the regularly allowed quart or fifth of whiskey and a quart or fifth of brandy, one fifth—not a quart—of bourbon during the month. That is, if the dividend supply holds out.

The dividend was made possible, the commission explained, because Bourbon purchases for the first quarter of 1944 were less than expected by the commission.

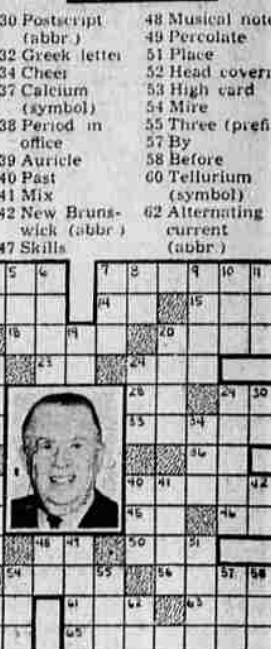
Navy Transport Plane Wreck Yields 17 Bodies

FLAGSTAF, Ariz., April 29.—(AP)—Seventeen bodies were found by the first person to reach the wreckage of a navy transport plane that broke in two and burned on the lava rock studded Anderson mesa in northern Arizona. The crash occurred during a heavy snowstorm in wilderness 30 miles southeast of here. Four injured survivors were brought to Flagstaff hospitals. The navy had reported 22 aboard.

emy parties. Southeast of Imphal, a Gurkha battalion recaptured a position and staved off counterattacks, it was announced.

Allied chindits blew up a railway north of Indaw, which lies south of the Mogaung valley in north Burma where, the bulletin added, Lt. Gen. Stilwell's American forces occupied two more villages in their drive on Kamalung.

Chinese Repulse Japs
Meanwhile Japanese troops which penetrated into Hualao pass in a drive toward Luyang have been thrown back with heavy casualties, and the pass again is entirely in Chinese hands, a high command communiqué declared today.

Hualao pass is west of Chenghsien, captured by the invaders.

The bulletin said other Chinese successes southeast of Luyang further have reduced the danger to that northern Honan province city. The Japanese in this sector were pushed back 10 miles toward Mhsien, it added.

A Japanese column driving southward from Chenghsien and east of the Peiping-Hankow railroad has been halted and forced back after advancing 30 miles, the high command said, describing the general situation as improved.

ADVANCED ALLIED HEAD-QUARTERS, New Guinea, April 29.—(AP)—

Allied planes are roaming the skies at will the length of New Guinea and beyond, keeping Japanese airfields immobilized while American troops consolidated and expanded their positions in the Hollandia and Aitape areas.

The few Japanese attempting to stop the American steamproller were flattened and survivors fled into the hills and jungles.

ATTENTION WOOL GROWERS Here Are Details of the CCC Wool Purchase Plan as Detailed By WFA

Details of the 1944 domestic wool purchase program to be conducted by the CCC have been announced by the WFA. It is stated that the prices paid by the corporation are, in general, the ceiling prices less transportation and marketing expenses and a charge of 14c per pound made to cover the costs of appraisal, storage, and interest.

In the case of certain short wools and off-wools, however, the purchase prices have been adjusted in line with the normal relationship between the values of such qualities and the value of longer and higher quality wool. These adjustments were necessary because the ceiling prices were devised only as maximum limitations and were not intended to measure relative values for the very short length and off-quality wools.

CCC will continue to purchase wool through the established dealers and co-operative associations who will purchase, store, handle and sell wool for the account of the corporation. The purchase and sale values are determined on the basis of appraisals made by official appraisal committees under the direction of the chief wool appraiser of the Office of Distribution of the War Food Administration. The agreements under which dealers and co-operative associations will operate for the account of the corporation are substantially the same as those in effect during 1943.

Smaller Lot Limit Under 3,000 Pounds
Under the 1944 agreement, primary handlers operating for the account of CCC and secondary handlers or pools who operate independently but, in turn, sell their wool to the corporation, may purchase outright lots of less than 3,000 pounds each to permit immediate settlement with producers and to simplify the handling of small lots. In all cases the

wool will be purchased on the basis of official appraisals and the profits if any, of handlers or secondary handlers on wool purchased by them on a basis of their own valuations will be limited to the handling charges allowed in the case of wool taken on consignment.

Growers will continue to have the right in all cases to consign their wool and have it purchased by the corporation on the basis of the official appraisals. Producers, pools, and secondary handlers may obtain partial payments in advance of the appraisal on wool which is to be graded, scoured, or carbonized. In the case of wool which is to be graded, the advance will be 75 per cent of the estimated appraisal value and in the case of wool which is to be scoured or carbonized the advance will be 80 per cent of the estimated appraisal value. No interest will be charged with respect to such advances, but the handlers are authorized to deduct 1c per pound of grease wool to offset the additional expenses in connection with such advances.

Handling Charge, Storage Provisions Changed

Handlers are permitted a maximum handling charge of 14c per pound on lots of 5,000 pounds or more and 21c per pound on lots of less than 5,000 pounds for handling grease wool. Under the 1943 program handlers were permitted maximum charges of not in excess of 14c per pound for lots of 5,000 pounds or more; 2c per pound for lots of 1,000 pounds to 5,000 pounds; and 21c per pound for lots of less than 1,000 pounds of grease wool.

Handlers will not be required to provide free storage for a period varying from one to four months, as was the case under the 1943 program, but CCC does reserve the right to require han-

dlers to carry insurance at their own expense on the whole or partial value of wool in case the wool is stored in warehouses having a high insurance rate. Secondary handlers and pools which buy wool from producers and subsequently sell it to Commodity Credit Corporation will be required to furnish to their local County Agricultural Conservation Committee a certification of the prices paid producers if they are to receive the maximum price from Commodity Credit Corporation. Country services performed by secondary handlers, pools, or handlers with the approval of CCC have been defined and handling charges have been established for each of three types of services. For collecting wool in bulk from farms, transporting it to assembly points, packing and bagging, the allowance will be 11c per pound, grease weight; for receiving wool at country assembly points, packing, bagging, and otherwise handling, the allowance will be 11c per pound grease weight; and for performing lesser country services the allowance will be 1c per pound grease weight.

Revisions In Country Service

Pools and secondary handlers who receive small lots and assemble them into lots of 5,000 pounds or more will receive 21c, 21c, and 11c per pound grease weight, respectively, for the above services. Under the 1943 agreement the rates were 11c per pound grease weight for small lots and 21c per pound grease weight when small lots were accumulated into lots of 5,000 pounds or more. The revisions in connection with country services provide for a more accurate adjustment of handling charges to the services actually performed by the handler, secondary handler, or pool.
