**Canol Oil Ready for Allied War Machine**

**WHITEHORSE**, Yukon Territory, May 1.—(AP)—A \$130,000, 000 American-financed oil project known as "Canol" was ready to deliver fuel for the allied war machine in northern Canada and Alaska.

The Whitehorse refinery, linked by 595 miles of four-inch, above-ground pipeline to the oil source at Fort Norman, N. W. T., was opened officially yesterday, marking the culmination of 22 months of work by thousands of Canadians and Americans.

The refinery will furnish aviation fuel for planes using airfields between Edmonton and Fairbanks, Alaska; gasoline for trucks along the long Alaska highway and Diesel fuel for use in tractors and similar equipment.

The United States will retain ownership of the pipeline until the end of the war, when it will be offered for sale, with the Canadian government having the first right to purchase.

**Towns to Buy Bonds for Their Service Personnel**

**LYON MOUNTAIN, N. Y.**, May 1.—(AP)—Residents of this iron mine village and neighboring Standish are chipping in to give each of their service men and women a \$25 war bond.

There are 110 men and women in the armed forces from the two communities, whose total population is approximately 3,500. The plan, however, includes those who enter service in the future, and any discharged before they receive their bonds.

**Meat Boake Carter**, Correspondent, columnist, and one of the most famous of all radio news commentators. Born in Baku in the Russian Caucasus, where his father was serving in the British consular service, educated in England, he left college in 1917 to join the royal air force, and still has a game knee as a memento of a crash in Scotland during his training. Carter came to the U. S., in 1920 and has been a citizen since 1933. His distinctive style and clipped accent draws over a million fan letters in a single year—and that is Boake Carter, on Monday through Friday at 9 in the morning.

**Meet Fulton Lewis, Jr.**: Most popular of all commentators on national affairs, winner "hands down" of a poll among members of congress on the news commentator they believe does the best job of reporting national news. Born and educated in Washington, D. C., graduate of the University of Virginia, he now spends his leisure time on his Maryland farm. His is married and has a son and daughter. His broad-

casts come to you twice daily—in the afternoon and a rebroadcast at 9:30 in the evening. Called "The greatest reporter alive today" by Hillboard Magazine, he has more sponsors than any one on the air.

**Meet Gabriel Heatter**: Reporter, law graduate, overseas correspondent and writer who broke into radio at the time of the Lindbergh kidnapping trial. Going on the air for what was supposed to be a 5-minute broadcast, he ad libbed for a record of 52 minutes that made radio history—and a new radio commentator was the result. New York born, starting as a copy boy on a newspaper, advancing to a reporter's status, he studied law at New York University Law college, graduating in the same class with LaGuardia. You hear him Monday through Friday at 5:45 on Sunday.
