Chinese Attempt To Stop Jap Drive In Honan Province

NEW YORK, May 2.—(AP)—One of three Japanese columns driving down the Peiping-Hankow railway on strategic Hsueh-chang has reached the gates of the Honan province city, and bitter fighting has been raging in the area since Sunday, the Chungking radio said today.

A second column received reinforcements and succeeded in breaking a Chinese encirclement ring 60 miles to the southeast of Hsueh-chang, said the broadcast, and the third, also reinforced, captured a village closer to their goal late yesterday.

In eastern Honan, the report said, Chinese forces have opened "large scale mobile warfare" in an effort to check the deep Japanese thrusts. Chungking said that the enemy, driving westward, continued its advance in a northwesterly direction after occupying Yinghsang, which was captured April 27.

In Honan, the broadcast said, Chinese troops killed or wounded 700 Japanese Saturday in the fighting for Mhsien, and lost 300 of their own troops. Yesterday's high command communique reported that the Chinese were pressing on Mhsien from three sides, while to the north the Japanese occupied important Hulao pass and prepared for an offensive on Loyang, to the west.

Fireman Rescues Pair Trapped In Auto in Rapids

SPOKANE, May 2.—(AP)—City Fireman Kenneth Bye crawled 100 feet over the Spokane river rapids on a fire department ladder in today's dawn light to rescue two persons trapped in a half submerged taxi which had plunged from the Howard street bridge.

Firemen said the cab, driven by Robert Pearson and with Beverly Osso, 18, as a passenger, struck a light standard, careened across the bridge and smashed through the wooden guard rail, dropping about 30 feet into the stream just above Spokane falls. The department extended its ladder horizontally from the bridge to its 100-foot length and Bye volunteered to try the rescue. His weight, when he slid down a rope from the end of the ladder and struck his small target, partially caved in the cab top.

The river was smashing high against the doors, but Bye was able to open one and help Pearson and Miss Osso to the top of the machine. He said the girl was hysterical and fought him, so he called for sedative tablets and these were tossed to him. Firemen lowered a rope and the three were lifted one at a time to safety.

Keep Three Dozen Eggs Ahead, Appeal To Homemakers

With the "eat more eggs" campaign sweeping into its final phase, Frank Squier, area supervisor of the War Food administration's Office of Distribution at Eugene, today urged patriotic homemakers to keep a constant supply of three dozen eggs in their refrigerators.

"Farm fresh eggs are now at their peak of goodness and response to our appeal to 'buy an extra dozen' has certainly helped absorb the record supplies arriving at market," said Squier. "However, if during the next three weeks every homemaker, who has a refrigerator, will keep a working supply of three dozen eggs on hand it will relieve a critical storage situation at just the right time."

Lauding "that loyal soldier of production, the hen," Squier pointed out, that to assure a fresh egg supply for the low-production months ahead, farmers must be encouraged to keep their flocks intact by being able to sell present temporary abundant production at fair prices.

Squier stated that because consumers, the egg industry and retailers have cooperated so splendidly thus far in the campaign, egg supplies for both military and civilians in the months to come should be adequate, if not better than last year.

Pointing out that the average family probably uses one to three dozen eggs a week, Squier claimed that keeping a constant supply of three dozen on hand should not cause any inconvenience.

"Most folks buy eggs a dozen at a time. Stepping this up to three dozen at the outset and replenishing the supply a dozen at a time would move a helpful quantity right now," said Squier. "Eggs will keep for weeks in a covered container in the refrigerator. If the three dozen supply is completely used and replenished within a week or ten days, the original carton is satisfactory."

Germany Boosts Marriages in Plan For Future Army

LISBON, May 2.—(AP)—A nationwide campaign has been opened in Germany to shuffle war-shattered families and encourage new marriages to keep the reich's birthrate at a high level, Nazi newspapers available here reveal.

Newly established municipal marriage brokerage bureaus, operating without fees, are trying to bring together the woman whose husband fell in battle and the soldier on furlough whose wife died in an air raid, and are encouraging unmarried women to choose mates from among disabled soldiers returned to civil life.

The obvious objective is to speed up a natural process of readjustment that would lead normally after the war to many new marriages—and babies capable of carrying arms 20 years hence for the German homeland.

According to Der Angriff of Berlin, Nazi labor front organ, not enough disabled soldiers have registered so far to provide husbands for all the women who have offered themselves as prospective brides.

Apparently discharged veterans who have lost legs, arms or their eyesight are wondering how

they will be rehabilitated for a civil occupation and hesitate to venture into marriage.

To overcome this reluctance, placards advertising the marriage bureaus have been posted in all military hospitals and lectures have been arranged in hospitals and convalescent camps explaining in its aims. Newspapers are helping by printing articles romanticizing marriages of girls with such veterans.

The strict rationing of food and beverages in Germany has been relaxed to facilitate social gatherings where representatives of the marriage bureaus arrange meetings of prospective wedding principals.

Last year, according to published German figures, there were 625,906 marriages in Germany, "more than might have been expected under the circumstances." In the same year, according to these statistics, 1,539,841 babies were born—reported as an increase of four per cent above the 1942 figure.
