Tugwell's Rule in Puerto Rico Flayed

WASHINGTON, May 2—(AP)—Puerto Ricans are "almost on the verge of revolution," Bolivar Pagan, the island's resident commissioner in congress, declared in demanding the resignation of Gov. Rexford Guy Tugwell.

"If the American flag had not been waving over Puerto Rico the people would have already gone into open revolt by arms," Pagan said in a statement and interview.

"What the people want right now is the reestablishment and enforcement of the present organic act and the immediate removal of Governor Tugwell, to reestablish in Puerto Rico a government of law and honesty and a real government by the majority of the people."

Pagan declared "Tugwell's dictatorial attitude can be matched only by Hitler's and Mussolini's tactics."

The governor, he said, travels with an armed guard, and lives a life of luxury in a 300-year-old Spanish castle "more comfortable than the White House, with 30 servants, eight automobiles, and two summer homes."

Shortly before Tugwell moved in, Pagan said, the United States spent \$500,000 in remodeling the \$1,500,000 castle.

Whiskey Exchange Made To Boost Oregon Supply

PORTLAND, May 2—(AP)—To increase Oregon's whiskey supply, the state liquor control commission has traded 2,000 barrels of young bourbon to two eastern distilleries for bottled blended whiskeys.

Administrator Ray Conway said the stock was part of the 20,000 barrels obtained last fall through purchase of the Waterfill and Frazier and Shawhan distilleries in Kentucky in a joint transaction with the Washington state liquor board.

The whiskeys obtained in the trade are so-called spirit blends, from whiskey and neutral spirits, Conway said. The move was made, he said, because the program for bottling the barreled Kentucky whiskey would extend over a period of from 18 months to two years and still would be immature, only 34 months old.

W. E. Thrasher, Glide School Teacher, Dies

CORVALLIS, May 2—(AP)—Walter E. Thrasher, instructor in the Glide high school, near Roseburg, before he was taken ill, died in Corvallis Sunday. He was a graduate of the Oregon College of Education at Monmouth and the University of Oregon.

Thrasher was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Thrasher of Philomath and had two brothers in the armed forces. The funeral will be held here Wednesday.

He was a member of the I. O. O. F. lodge of Roseburg.
