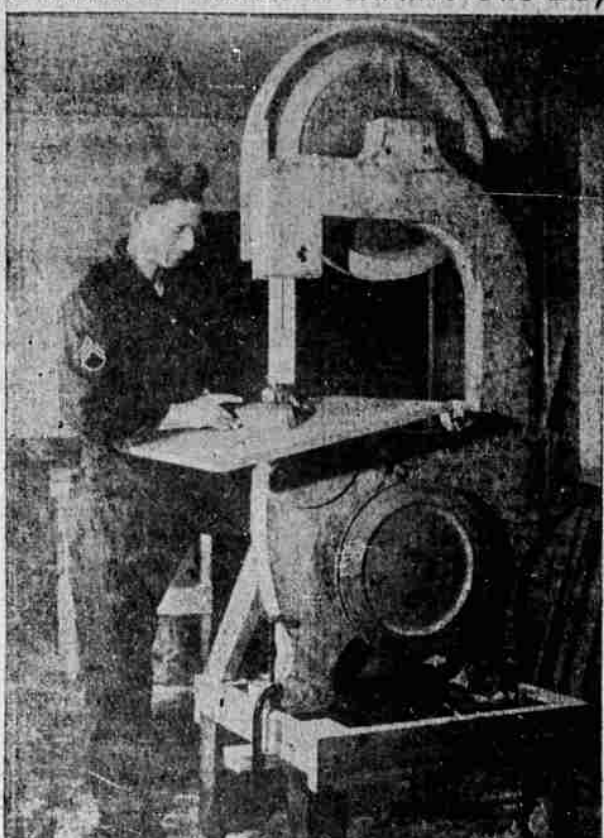

From there on it was easy. The unit was built, tested and proved a success.

Device Made of Scraps
Sergeant Fair put the device together from scraps. All his metal parts—the bearings, guides, the main shaft, plus all blade adjustments were fashioned from salvaged materials. For his wood frame, he used lumber taken from discarded packing cases, and the belt was once the inner liner of a truck tire.

Sergeant Fair, who has hobbled airplanes since boyhood, worked as a carpenter for the Oregon Forestry service, and also at Fort Greeley, the army's Kodiak, Alaska, base. He was graduated from Glendale high school in 1934, and later joined the Civilian Conservation Corps for eleven months.

Prior to his enlistment in the army in December, 1942, he was employed at Puget sound. He is credited with 50 hours flying time as a civilian pilot.
