Postwar Rivers, Harbors Program Opposed by Ickes

WASHINGTON, May 4.—(AP)—Interior Secretary Ickes objected today to house-approved legislation authorizing a \$400,000,000 postwar rivers and harbors program on the ground it reverses congressional policies and violates "historic American land policy."

Specifically, Ickes offered four objections during a senate commerce subcommittee hearing:

1. The bill departs from congressional policy in failing to provide any standards for the marketing of electric power to be generated at some federal projects.

2. It "ignores" traditional anti-land monopoly and anti-speculation policies which congress has developed in federal reclamation laws for protection of farmers by failing to provide that its basic laws shall be applicable to irrigation features of multiple-purpose projects authorized by the bill.

3. It fails to give adequate protection to water requirements essential to the irrigation economy of the upper Missouri river basin states.

4. It scraps long-established congressional policy for the most beneficial use of reclaimed lands by exempting central valley lands in California from the excess-land provisions of federal reclamation laws at a time when such provisions are needed to assure benefits of federal investments in this project to returning veterans.

Under present provisions the power projects authorized by the bill, Ickes contended, would be constructed with no provision for the application of public benefit which should govern their operation.

Ickes also urged "integration" of power developments at the Bonneville project in Oregon by establishment of one sales agency, and endorsed an amendment by Senator Bone (D-Wash.) to allow the interior department to sell and distribute all power generated from reclamation projects.

Bank Agent Here to Check Credit Rules Compliance

Bert V. Chappel, of the Federal Reserve bank of San Francisco, Portland branch, is in Roseburg calling on retail merchants in connection with regulations controlling consumer credits. Mr. Chappel reports that in a long period of investigation work he has found few willful violations of the federal regulations. His purpose is to check compliance and to assist merchants in becoming fully acquainted with requirements. He will be in Roseburg for a week or ten days, according to his present plans.

C. V. Winn to Speak Here On Christian Science

Charles V. Winn, Pasadena, California, a member of the Christian Science board of lectureship, will be a speaker in Roseburg Saturday night. He will be heard at the First Church of Christ, Scientist, where he will speak on the subject "Christian Science: A Message of Freedom and Dominion."

The Roseburg congregation is urging attendance of members, friends and all persons interested.

Article Critical Of Gen. M'Arthur Banned by Govt.

NEW YORK, May 4.—(AP)—An editorial in the May issue of Harper's, deploring army censorship, discloses that the War department banned an article critical of General Douglas MacArthur which was to have appeared in an earlier issue of the magazine.

The article, written by Walter Lucas, British correspondent for the London Daily Express, was submitted to the War department last February. When it was barred the editors protested, but to no avail. Frederick L. Allen, editor of the magazine, said. They then submitted the article to the office of censorship, Allen said, "but that office did nothing about it."

Advanced proofs of the editorial, appearing in lieu of the banned article, were sent to congressmen for their reaction and to newspapers for editorial comment, with April 26 as the release date, Allen said. Due to publication difficulties, the magazine did not appear until April 28.

The article's contents perforce cannot be disclosed but the army letter prohibiting its publication reveals its critical nature. The letter says:

"The War department regrets that it must withhold approval for publication of the attached article, 'MacArthur and His Command' by Walter Lucas on the grounds of security.

"The article as written undermines the confidence of this country, Australia, and particularly the troops in that theater, in their commander and his strategic and tactical plans. Such a result would be of great value to the axis and damaging to General MacArthur's very difficult campaign in the southwest Pacific."

Presidency Angle Involved
The editorial said the magazine editors were not opposed to censorship of information that might be of value to the enemy but criticized censorship that prevented free public discussion of a prospective candidate for the presidency.

"As we go to press, General MacArthur has not denied receptiveness to a nomination for the presidency of the United States," said the editorial. "No candidate for the presidency, tacit or otherwise, should be hidden behind a veil of censorship."

The editorial was mailed out before General MacArthur announced his refusal to be a candidate, Allen said. Commenting on it today, Allen noted the coincidence of the MacArthur announcement three days after the editorial reached official desks in Washington.

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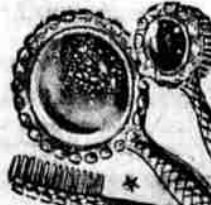
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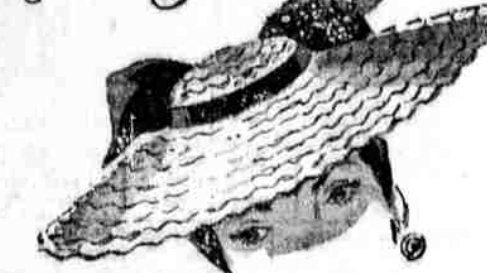
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
