We cannot understand how people can desecrate the Great Outdoors. We were shocked to hear from the lips of Vern Harpman, supervisor of the Umpqua National forest, of the vandalism at Fish lake. How anyone could girldle trees, scatter garbage and filth about the camp, break glass recklessly in trails, is more than we can understand.

Yet every roadside has its pile of garbage. There are people who respect no property other than their own. There are people who will throw empty bottles into a stream and then shoot at them, leaving broken glass to cut the feet of bathers. There are people who throw beer and whiskey bottles into roadways to slash tires. People who will toss cans, papers, rags and other refuse along scenic roads.

The outdoor manners of many people are unspeakably bad. Well, there we go again! We started out to talk about fishing and wound up all overwrought because some people have the manners of pigs. It's time to go fishing!
