

RHS 3rd at Track Meet; 4 Qualify For State Card

The Roseburg high school Indians finished third in the District No. 4 track meet at Eugene Friday, being nosed out by Springfield and Cottage Grove. Springfield tallied 35 points, Cottage Grove 32, and Roseburg 24. University high of Eugene and Junction City each collected 17 points, St. Mary's (Eugene) 6, and Mohawk 1.

Roseburg was in front until late in the meet, but lacked a pole vaulter and javelin thrower, and consequently lost enough points by this lack of entries to be crowded out of the first spot.

Four of the Roseburg contestants, Krell, Horn, Ramp and Linaman, qualified for the state meet. Krell, who won first in

both low and high hurdles, was high point man for the meet with a total of 101. Horn finished second in the high hurdles and Cummings was fourth in low hurdles. Ramp ran second in the mile, being crowded out by inches in a homestretch sprint for the tape. Linaman won second in the high jump and Marr placed third in the shot put. The Roseburg relay team finished in third place.

New Records Set.

Several district marks were broken. Bob Boqua, Springfield, hurled the javelin 175 feet to shatter the old mark of 154 feet 10 inches, hung up by Benny Dufresne, Roseburg, ten years ago. The district discus record was broken by Bob Nelson, Junction City, who tossed the platter 140 feet 11 inches. The former record was 134 feet, 10 inches.

The Roseburg team will return to Eugene Tuesday for a triangular meet with Springfield and University high. The four qualified athletes will go to Corvallis Friday for the state meet.

Rounding out the week's athletic program, Coach Hod Turner will take the baseball team to Myrtle Creek Wednesday for a return engagement.

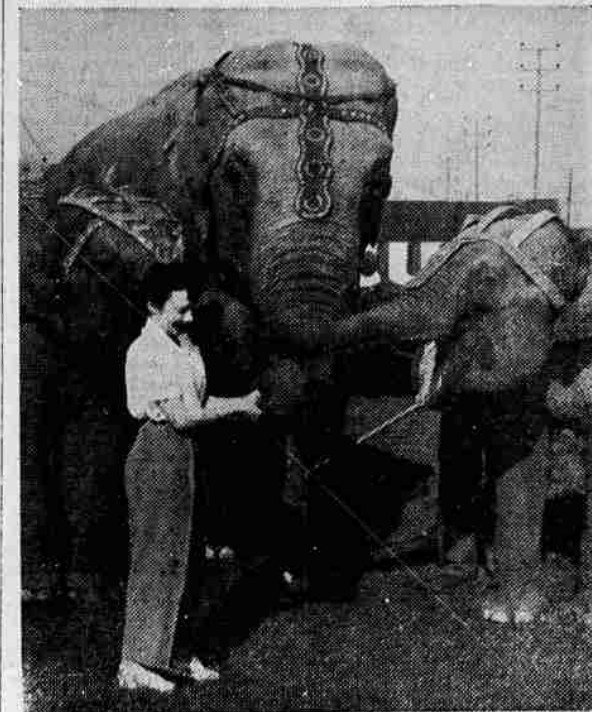

Cordon-Sprague Race Clean

The republican contests for United States senator offer a unique contrast in campaign technique. Voters are being treated to a clean, though nonetheless heated, battle between Guy Cordon of Douglas county and Charles A. Sprague of Marion county for the short term. Cordon, now serving by appointment, having been selected to fill the vacancy left by the death of Senator McNary, has already attracted considerable attention by the effective manner in which he has prosecuted to successful conclusion some of the uncompleted work of Senator McNary. Ex-Governor Charles A. Sprague holds the advantage of being better known throughout the state than Cordon, but the latter is being aided by a strong organization. Lesser lights in the campaign are Henry Black of Multnomah county, the candidate who proposes himself for president, but doubtless would be satisfied with a senatorship, and John McBride of Multnomah county.

Contrasted with the dignified Cordon-Sprague race, is the slambang, mul-singing, name-calling, catch-as-catch-can battle royal between Senator Rufus C. Holman, Multnomah county, seeking re-nomination and election, and Wayne Morse of Lane county. Earl E. Fisher of Washington county is the third man in the ring.

Willis Mahoney of Klamath county is seeking the democratic nomination for the short term, while Walter W. Whitbeck and Edgar E. Smith, both of Multnomah county are the candidates for the full term nomination.

Congressman Harris Ellsworth of Douglas county, has no opposition on the republican ticket for representative in congress from the Fourth district, while Floyd K. Dover, Josephine county, is the sole democratic candidate.

Neuner Opposed by Lomax

Leslie M. Scott, Multnomah county, is the republican candidate county, is the republican candidate T. Lambert, Clackamas county, is the lone democrat in the field for that office.

George Neuner, Yamhill county, formerly of Douglas county, serving as attorney general by appointment, is opposed for the republican nomination by Leroy L. Lomax, Multnomah county. The democrats have a single candidate for the office in the person of Bruce Spalding, Marion county.

Douglas county's present delegation to the state legislature, Thomas Parkinson, senator, and Robert C. Gile and Carl C. Hill, representatives, have no opponents for the republican nomination in the field on the democratic side.

J. V. Long, candidate for the republican nomination for district attorney, also is unopposed, and there is no democratic candidate.

For the first time in history, so far as can be learned, there is not a contest for any county office. Republican candidates for nomination are D. N. Busenbark, county judge; H. B. Roadman, commissioner; O. T. Carter, sheriff; Oliver L. Johnson, treasurer; Ben B. Irving, surveyor, and Har-

Dam Ruin Blow To Fate

Today's newest blows on the Balkan communication system came as German forces dug in opposite the British Eighth army on the Adriatic sector of the Italian front were believed to be suffering extreme communications hardships as the result of the destruction of the Pescara river dam.

Reconnaissance photographs made this afternoon showed that all waters in the river formerly impounded by the dam were gone, but the official Mediterranean air force report said it had been impossible so far "to assess the full damage which will be done to German communications." The flood resulting from the dam break apparently inundated a considerable area.
