The performance gave the Angels a 2-0 win and a split of their doubleheader, the Seals taking the opener 5-4. The Angels topped San Francisco 4-2 Saturday.

Portland took both ends of their Sunday double bill against Sacramento after losing 9-4 in a 10-1 inning struggle Saturday. Sunday verdicts came by 6-2 and 4-2 scores to strengthen the Beaver club on second place, while Seattle dumped San Diego 3-0 in Sunday's opener but faded 5-2 in the finale. Saturday night's contest went to San Diego 3-0. Turpin hurled the shut-out in the first game.

Hollywood continued to club Oakland into submission, taking three more games over the weekend to make a clean sweep of the seven-game series. Saturday's tally was 8-4 while Sunday triumphs came 9-3 and 13-6.

Comellas' hurling performance for the Angels was the first no-hit game since early in the 1943 season when Phippen, of Oakland, shut out Sacramento, also in a seven-inning affair.

ARTHUR BROS. circus as it appeared in Roseburg last Saturday. I know now that early summer definitely is here. Last week I ate my first rhubarb pie which, with the coming of the circus, is all the proof I need.

I've never been able to define the odor of a circus exactly—that is, what you might call the overall odor; I can spot a few of the more individualistic smells without difficulty. But whatever it is, it's entrancing and exhilarating. Predominant is the fragrance of trampled grass.

The act which interested me the most was Jorgen Christiansen's trained Criollo stallions. I don't know what "Criollo" means, but didn't need to. The horses are beauties and painstakingly trained to perform any number of intricate maneuvers. Captain Christiansen himself was a familiar figure. I've seen his mastery exhibitions in many a circus in past years, as I assume you, too, have.

The Escalante troupe, aerialists, provided the necessary thrills as they swung unerringly (sometimes blindfolded) from bar to bar high above the heads of the crowd. The members of this family worked swiftly, precisely and gracefully.

I hope Arthur Bros. bring their circus back to Roseburg sometime. It is a pretty doggone nice little circus. You may bet they have their wartime troubles, too—but meet them ingeniously, as has been the way with seasoned circus people of all time.

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Freedom of Man Divinely Ordered, Speaker Declares

Man's freedom is a part of the divine order of things—God-bestowed and God-established—Charles V. Winn, C. S. B., Pasadena, California, member of the Board of Lectureship of the Mother church, First Church of Christ Scientist, said Saturday night, speaking on the subject "Christian Science: A message of Freedom and Dominion." He spoke before a large audience at the Roseburg church.

"History records the human race's effort to obtain a greater sense of freedom," he declared. "All right endeavor is impelled by a desire to overcome that which limits or restricts, and to attain that which brings freedom and liberation. The human race, on its upward march, has instinctively rebelled against anything that would try to take away its religious, political or economic liberty."

Pointing out that in the creation God gave man "dominion" over created things, the speaker pointed out that "freedom is man's natural status, bestowed upon him by his creator.

"In looking back upon the lives of those who have been the greatest benefactors of our race, there is one who stands out above them all," the speaker said. "Our great Master, Jesus the Christ, possessed and demonstrated a greater measure of freedom than anyone who has ever lived. He overcame and destroyed every form of bondage that flesh is heir to. False theology has taught us that He was endowed with some supernatural power which made this possible, but the Biblical record and secular history completely refute this. The Scriptures contain many unfulfilling proofs that many others besides Jesus availed themselves of divine power and thus attained their freedom from adverse conditions. It was only after corruption and materiality had crept into the early Christian church that this healing power seemed to be lost and to become dormant."

Mr. Winn closed his address by recounting the experience of Mary Baker Eddy, declaring that: "She found her healing was not miraculous but was in perfect accord with God's will and the divine law."
