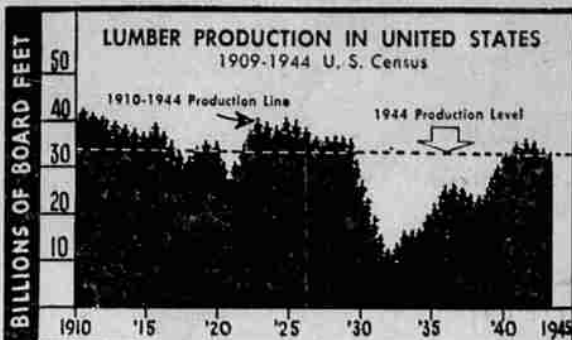

Lend-Lease Faces Restrictions in Extension Grant

WASHINGTON, May 9. — (AP) — Prospects that congress may impose new limitations on the use of lend-lease funds appeared today in the wake of senate approval of legislation extending the war aid program for another year beyond July 1.

Still awaiting action is the administration's request for an additional \$3,500,000,000 in lend-lease appropriations, and some senators are out to make certain the funds are used for war purposes and nothing else.

Senator Langer (R-N.D.), who cast the only vote yesterday against continuing the program, said he was "unalterably opposed to the reckless, nonsensical and almost criminal squandering of our raw materials."

The senate wrote into the house-approved extension bill an even tighter ban against negotiation by the president of any lend-lease settlements involving post-war economic, military or diplomatic policy commitments without treaty approval by the senate.

The bill went back to the house for concurrence.

Cattlemen Favor Price Control but Oppose Subsidies

PRIMEVILLE, Ore., May 9. — (AP) — Herbert Chandler of Baker is the new president of the Oregon Cattle and Horse Raisers' association.

He was elected to succeed Robert Lister of Paulina at the close of the annual convention Saturday. Enterprise was chosen for next year's meeting.

The 250 delegates voted in favor of extending price control legislation for the duration but against food subsidy payments. They urged simplification of price control machinery with provision for appeal to constituted courts.

The stockmen also urged total elimination of meat rationing and urged adoption of a national meat management plan as proposed by national livestock committees last year.

Mrs. Annie Boyd Dies Here at Age of 92

Mrs. Annie Boyd, 92, died at her home, 1266 Umpqua Ave., Roseburg, Monday evening, following a long illness. Born at Beverly, New Jersey, Jan. 18, 1852, she came to Roseburg in October, 1913. Her husband died in 1899.

Surviving are a son and daughter, Verne Boyd, Roseburg, and Georgia Boyd, Santa Fe, N. M. She also leaves a brother, George B. Scheffey, Brown's Valley, Minn.

The body has been removed to the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors and is being prepared for removal to Portland for services and cremation.

Military Terms "D-Day" And "H-Hour" Explained

(By the Associated Press) The term "D-day," now prominent in the news from Britain, is an army expression used to refer to, but not reveal, the time fixed for a military action such as an attack on a local front or the start of an invasion.

Similar verbal camouflage is "H-hour," the exact minute for action on "D-day." The expressions are this war's counterparts of the World War I term "zero-hour," the time when troops "went over the top" from their

trenches to attack the enemy. In discussing their strategy, commanders may frequently mention "D-day" even though all present know exactly what day is meant. Thus the secret is safe—even if the walls have ears.

Lt. Finnell Injured In Plane Explosion

Second Lieutenant Ben L. Finnell, former Sutherlin resident, now living at Redmond, Ore., is back from England and is on crutches as a result of a leg injury, his uncle, T. J. Brown, Roseburg city treasurer, reported today. Lieut. Finnell, who learned to fly as a member of the Umpqua Flying club at Roseburg, was a member of a Flying Fortress crew which bombed Ludwigshafen as his 13th mission over Germany. The plane, badly damaged by flak, succeeded in reaching English soil, but blew up before reaching the base. Six of the crew members were killed by the explosion. Finnell parachuted to safety, but suffered a serious leg injury. He is the brother of Frank Finnell, Sutherlin. His mother, Lenna Finnell, recently moved from Sutherlin to Brightwood, Oregon. Lieut. Finnell's wife and two children are at Redmond.
