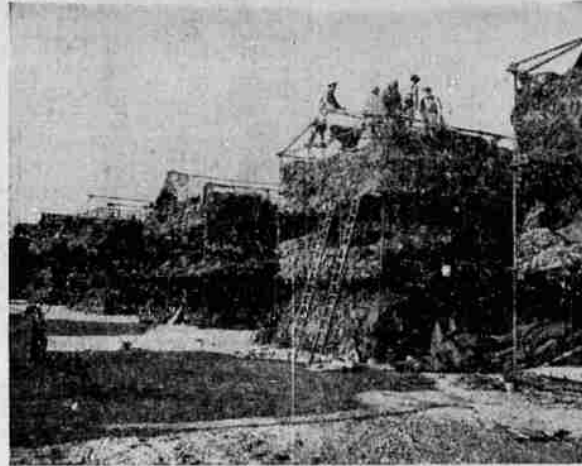

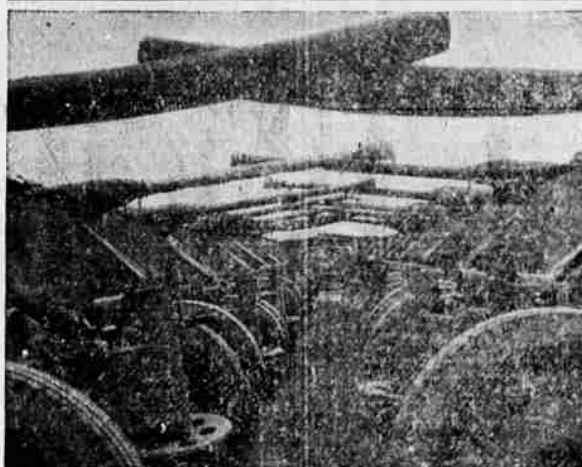

Deadline Nears For Signing Up Farm Plan Sheets

Douglas county farmers were reminded this week that only two weeks remain for signing 1944 farm plan sheets indicating their 1944 war food production.

This same form may be used for indicating participation in the AAA program of practices to increase production. May 31 is the deadline for signing at the county office or with a community AAA committeeman.

L. S. Compton, member of the county AAA committee, reported that to date 575 have completed farm plan sheets covering production on approximately 50,000 acres of county farmland.

The intentions expressed on the farm plan sheets and requests for prior approval of practices received from farmers indicate that county farmers are finding the 1944 soil-building practice program of considerable assistance in attaining war food production goals, the committeeman reported.

Elimination of the individual farm allowance provision is stimulating widespread interest among farmers and ranchers, especially those who have a big conservation job to do.

Practices in which interest is

especially high were listed by Mr. Compton, vice-chairman, as turning under green manure crops, application of phosphate, gypsum, and lime, reseeding depleted pastures. From recent indications, it is possible that the coming year may see more soil building and conservation work done than under previous AAA programs, the committeeman predicted.
