Teachers Assn. Endorses Proposed School Levy

PORTLAND, May 10. (AP)—Oregon State Teachers association today endorsed Portland's proposed \$5,000,000 school tax as an example to the rest of Oregon's school systems.

The association declared that the measure, financing local school improvements, would set a useful precedent to other cities. "Portland, because of its size, naturally sets the educational pace," the group said. "We feel it is important to education throughout Oregon that the Portland school measure pass."

Holdover Potatoes to Be Bought by CCC

PORTLAND, May 9. (AP)—The Commodity Credit corporation will purchase all holdover 1943 potatoes of specified grades, county AAA chairman were informed today by the state agricultural conservation committee office.

Purchases will be made through the county AAA offices, which will arrange shipment of the potatoes.

Basic prices were set at \$2.30

a hundredweight for U. S. No. 1, bagged; \$1.95 in bulk; \$2.10 for U. S. commercial, bagged; \$1.03 for U. S. No. 2 and small U. S. No. 1, in bulk. Slightly lower prices prevail in Malheur, Baker, Union, and Walla Walla counties. An additional 35 cents a hundredweight will be allowed for grading, sacking and delivering bulk storage potatoes.
