

RHS Indians Win Ball Game From Myrtle Creek, 4-2

In a fast, well-played game, the Roseburg Indians defeated the Myrtle Creek Vikings, 4 to 2, in a baseball game played Wednesday on the Myrtle Creek diamond. Roseburg started the scoring in the first inning, when Cummings singled and scored on Marr's double. Myrtle Creek went into the lead in the last half of the initial inning, when Wilkins drew a walk and scored ahead of Smith, who smashed the ball over the fence for a home run. Roseburg added two in the fourth which saw Marr single and race to third on Pope's sacrifice, then score on Mitchell's single. Cummings hit a fluke homer in the fifth, driving the ball down the right field line and into a ditch, where it was lost as the runner tagged the bases. Mitchell lost a second scoring opportunity in the sixth when he hit a long homer, but was called out for failure to touch second base. Marr, who pitched the game for Roseburg, allowed only three hits, collected seven strikeouts and gave four walks. Gaddis, starting for Myrtle Creek, was rapped for five hits, struck out four and gave one walk. Gazley, who relieved him, allowed two hits and had two strikeouts.

4 Teams Bunched For Lead of Coast Baseball League

The Pacific Coast Baseball league race tightened up last night only three games separating the first four teams, as Seattle defeated the San Francisco Seals, 4-3, to boost their third place to within three games of the league leaders.

Meanwhile, the Hollywood Stars chalked up their eighth win in a row at the expense of Portland, 8-5. The victory gave the Stars a second place tie along with the Beavers, just a game ahead of Seattle.

Seattle's star righthander, DeMorgan, limited the Seals to eight hits and blanked them in all but the sixth inning, besides batting in one run himself in last night's victory.

At Portland, the Stars blasted out nine hits and six runs in the first three innings to sew up the game.

In the south Los Angeles took both ends of a doubleheader, by

identical scores of 4-2, from San Diego, and Oakland won a 12-inning 7-6 battle with Sacramento when Acorn Manager Camilli doubled with one aboard in the final frame.
