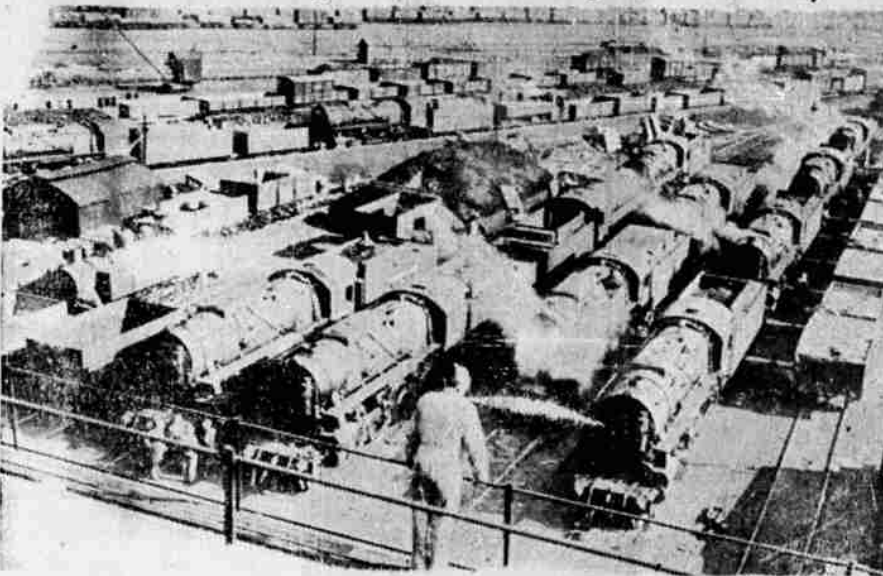

Close Friends for Years Killed Same Day in War

JACKSON, Mo., May 11.—(AP)—Two men from this small Missouri town, Walter Burgfeld, 37, and John T. Klobe, 36, close friends for years prior to their induction into the army, continued that friendship to death.

Inducted February 8, 1942, the men were assigned to the same unit, were trained in the same camps and went overseas together.

Yesterday, relatives of both men received notification the two had been killed in action in the European area on the same day, April 28.

Oregon Baptists Rap Alcoholic "Education"

PORTLAND, May 12.—(AP)—The Oregon State Baptist convention yesterday denounced the alcoholic educational program of the Oregon liquor control commission.

The commission was criticized because it emphasized moderation instead of abstinence. The legislature was asked to enact a bill to make mandatory teaching of "the facts regarding alcohol."

Dr. Vance Webster, Eugene, was elected president and Corvallis selected as site of next year's meeting.

House Assents to Bill Extending Lend-Lease

WASHINGTON, May 12.—(AP)—The house today agreed to the senate's version of the lend-lease extension bill and by a voice vote sent the measure to the White House for President Roosevelt's signature.

The action assured continued lend-lease activities for another year beyond June 30, activities through which the United States has equipped the other allied nations with more than \$22,000,000,000 in war materials.

In the final version, the confederate provides that the president in asking settlements may not obligate the country to any postwar military or economic role without the specific consent of congress.

Indictment Filed in 39-Year-Old Slaying

FAIRMONT, W. Va., May 12.—(AP)—Benjamin Franklin Males, who established himself in St. Helens, Ore., and remained there in obscurity until he confessed a 39-year-old slaying, was indicted for murder yesterday by the Marion county grand jury. Prosecutor Harrison Conaway

said he believed Males, now 73, would be returned to Marion county sometime next week.

Witnesses told the grand jury that Walter C. Smith, 28-year-old crippled school teacher of Houli, near Fairmont, was bludgeoned November 16, 1905, after he had punished one of Males' children.

Washington Sues to Regain Jap-Owned Lands

OLYMPIA, Wash., May 12.—(AP)—A statewide program to transfer to the state the titles of real estate now owned by Japanese aliens got underway in Washington yesterday with filing of

suits in King, Spokane and Kitsap counties.

Similar suits will be instituted in several other counties, Acting Attorney General Fred Lewis said.

The program is being undertaken under a state law prohibiting aliens from owning real estate.

Farms operated in the state by Japanese, according to the 1940 census, had a total value of \$5,413,362.

"All proceeds from these escheated lands will go into the common school fund of the state, to assist in the education of the children of American citizens," Lewis said.

State Accident Board Counsel, Marsters, Quits

SALEM, Ore., May 12.—(AP)—Assistant Attorney General Collis R. Marsters, attorney for the state industrial accident commission, has resigned effective May 20, Attorney General Neuner said today.

Neuner refused to comment on a report that the accident commission had asked Neuner to dismiss Marsters.

Ralph Emmons, administrator for the commission, refused to comment.

Neuner said he has not found a successor to Marsters.

Emmons announced that Ray Laiky, Salem attorney, has been appointed to head the claims division, succeeding Jay Stockman, who resigned two weeks ago.

Russians Repulse Foe In Dnestr River Area

MOSCOW, May 12.—(AP)—The Russians announced today that a strong German assault against the red army bridgehead north-west of Tiraspol on the western bank of the lower Dnestr river had been repulsed yesterday with heavy losses to the enemy.

Elsewhere along the eastern front the lull continued, but in the air war the soviets reported various successes by Russian pilots.
