Roosevelt Claims Flaw In Rivers-Harbors Bill

WASHINGTON, May 12—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today that an omnibus rivers and harbors bill as passed by the house "failed to provide for the use of water for irrigation in accordance with tested laws and practices."

A controversy has developed between irrigation and navigation interests during hearings on the bill now before a senate commerce subcommittee, with the irrigation people asking for protective amendments on projects in the Missouri river and other western basins.

The president suggested adoption of an amendment similar to one introduced by Senator Bone (D-Wash.) which would give the secretary of the interior control over excess power and energy developed from the various projects. An amendment along the same lines was defeated by the house.
