Ceiling Prices on Frozen Fish Cut By OPA Order

WASHINGTON, May 13—(AP)—The OPA announced reductions yesterday averaging about 20 per cent in ceiling prices for frozen Pacific coast fish.

Reduction in processors' prices will reduce consumers' prices seven to ten cents a pound, OPA said.

In Seattle, Portland and San Francisco, the retail ceiling price of Pacific sole filets dropped from 52 to 42 cents a pound. Petrale sole filets were reduced from 54 to 46 cents a pound and true cod filets from 45 to 35 cents a pound.

The new amendment also stated that after May 31 the whole fish's net cost of any fish for which a new base price is set must be based on the new established price for the frozen fish irrespective of when the fish was bought or at what base price the purchase was made.

Another provision prohibits the ten per cent allowance on broken lots in sales of filets or steaks or in sales directly from the processor's original freezer.

The processors' prices in today's action are effective May 20 and follow recent seasonal reduction of producer and wholesale ceiling prices for fresh fish.

Arthur listed the Palau area to fight for the first time in his communications.

Palau, which stands like a gateway to the Philippines a little over 500 miles east of it, is the big Japanese naval base which underwent its first attack of the war March 29 and 30 by carrier planes of a huge task force.

Now it is within range of MacArthur's land-based bombers 800 miles southeast at Hollandia, Dutch New Guinea, and today he reported that a patrolling Liberator caused bomb damage Wednesday to a 1,000-ton enemy ship 300 miles east of Palau.

(The almost casual reference to the setting up of regular air patrols in the Palau area undoubtedly means the finishing touches have been completed on Hollandia's four captured airfields and that land-based air attacks on both Palau and the southern Philippines may be in the offing.)

SOUTHEAST ASIA HEADQUARTERS, Kandy, Ceylon, May 13.—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Stilwell's Chinese forces have opened what appears to be a major drive on the north Burma Japanese bases of Kamaing, Mogaung and Myitkya. It was announced today.

An official announcement said that Stilwell's advance columns holding Manipal, east of the Mogaung river and only 10 miles above the Japanese base of Kamaing, had repulsed an enemy attack on their position after inflicting considerable casualties, including two Japanese commanders.

Another of Stilwell's forces driving on Myitkya from the north was reported to have penetrated the perimeter of Japanese defenses about Hsiangbuk, strong outpost about 40 miles above Myitkya.

Spur to Mineral Prospecting Aim Of Cordon's Bill

WASHINGTON (Special)—Senator Guy Cordon is preparing legislation to stimulate prospecting on some 2,500,000 acres of mineral land in southwestern Oregon and to remove uncertainty as to the validity of established mining claims. A bill is now being drafted and should be ready for submission in the senate within the next few days.

The area in question has gold, copper, nickel, quicksilver, chrome and other minerals. Senator Cordon's bill will provide that the mineral lands shall continue subject to the federal mining laws, confirming all valid claims initiated after 1937, and, at the same time preserving timber values.

Senator Cordon stated, "a substantial cessation of prospecting has occurred in the area which is definitely inimical to the war effort. The present situation precludes new discoveries of minerals valuable to war production, particularly quicksilver and chrome.

Cordon's legislation is aimed at a so-called "bottleneck" which goes back to recapture by the government of title to railroad grant land. In taking this action, the government provided that the land was open to mineral exploration.

In 1937 an amendment was passed which specified that all of the land should be managed for continuous production of timber. The government construed the amendment to mean that general mining laws were repealed and the area no longer was subject to exploration and location of mining claims.

plants, and that at the Brux plant, in Czech Sudentland, fires were out of control in several units.

The Brux plant is one of the largest in German-controlled Europe, the bulletin said.

Louvain Cathedral Blasted
Louvain, about 18 miles east of Brussels, was hit heavily by British bombers Thursday night, in the campaign to paralyze German military communications. Haselt, about 30 miles east of Louvain, was visited yesterday by Thunderbolts and fighter-bombers of the U. S. Ninth air force aiming at railroad bridges.

The Paris radio, quoting Brussels reports, said the Louvain cathedral was almost completely destroyed in yesterday's attack and other severe damage was caused in the city.

The Berlin radio claimed the Americans lost 95 aircraft, including 82 big bombers in yesterday's attacks. A U. S. strategic air force communiqué stated officially that 42 heavy bombers, and 10 fighters were lost and claimed destruction of 150 enemy aircraft.

Auto With 6 Dives Into Columbia River; Two Die

LONGVIEW, Wash., May 13—(AP)—Two Longview high school girls were believed today to have drowned in the Columbia river near here about midnight, when an automobile in which an 18-year-old marine and five girls were riding plunged off an embankment into 24 feet of water.

The marine, Dale Wallace, Longview, smashed the glass in the window of the submerged car and helped three of the girls to shore before collapsing on the bank. The two girls missing were listed by state patrolmen as Phyllis Jeltze, 16, and Katherine McCormick, 17.

Wallace and the three other girls, Patsy Dooley, 17, Betty Trunde, 16, and Donna Trunde, 16, were hospitalized for treatment of injuries.

Drugging operations to locate the submerged car are in progress.

Locking of Trolley Car Baffles Pickpocket

SEATTLE, May 13—(AP)—After a city trolley coach had set for 15 minutes in downtown Seattle with doors locked and trolley detached, detectives arrived, queried passengers, arrested a suspect and left.

Pete Skokos, 39, had recovered the \$2,150 which he felt being lifted from his pocket as he stood on the crowded bus. His life savings, Skokos was moving the money from the bank to his brother, John, for safekeeping.

east of the Isle of Wight was scattered by the French destroyer La Combattante early today after an engagement in which one E-boat was sunk and another damaged, the British admiral today announced.

"The remainder of the enemy

force escaped at high speed under cover of smoke," the announcement said, adding that the destroyer, which suffered neither damage nor casualties, picked up a number of survivors.

British light naval forces in offensive sweeps off the French coast early yesterday attacked a small German convoy and set fire to two enemy vessels and damaged two others, the admiral today reported.

An admiralty communiqué said all the British vessels returned safely although there were a "small number of casualties and superficial damage."

Russians, Germans Battling at Vital Dnestr Bridgehead

LONDON, May 13—(AP)—Russian and German troops were locked in a fierce struggle on the west bank of the Dnestr river northwest of Hraspel today with the Germans hurling strong forces against the soviets in an attempt to wipe out the bridgehead.

A Russian communiqué said that in two days of fighting 4,000 German soldiers and 100 tanks had been knocked out by soviet troops defending the bridgehead, which provides the Russians with a potential jumping off place for another big push westward.

Announcing that the last remnants of axis forces trapped on the Crimean peninsula west of fallen Sevastopol had been eliminated, the soviet information bureau said that in the five-week Crimean campaign 111,687 German and Romanian troops were killed or captured. In addition, the broadcast said, Russian planes and ships of the Black sea fleet sank a total of 191 axis ships, including 69 transports and high-speed landing barges which the enemy was using for evacuating their trapped forces, adding greatly to axis casualties.

In addition to the axis troops killed, 61,687 were captured along with huge piles of military supplies, the announcement said.

W. M. Hodson Dies In Jacksonville

William M. Hodson, native of Roseburg and one of the city's first mechanics and automobile operators, died last Tuesday, May 9, at Jacksonville, Ore. He was 74 years of age and a son of the late Enos Hodson, a pioneer game warden of Douglas county. After a business career in Roseburg, he established the first automotive concern in Medford, Ore., in 1905, and shortly afterward sponsored the first car to drive to the rim of Crater lake.

Besides his wife, survivors include three sons, Lee Hodson, Fresno, Calif.; Lester Hodson, Spokane, Wash., and Roscoe Hodson, Portland, Ore., one brother and one sister, Roy Hodson, Seaside, Ore., and Mrs. C. B. Austin, Glendale, Ore.

French Naval Traitor Draws Life in Prison

ALGIERS, May 12—(AP)—A special military tribunal today convicted Admiral Edmond Derrin of treason and sentenced him to life imprisonment.

The former commander of the French naval base at Bizerte was accused of surrendering his forces to the Germans at the time of the American invasion of North Africa.

The court absolved him of surrendering the base voluntarily to the Germans, but convicted him of turning over the warships. This saved the admiral's life, for had he been convicted on both counts of the indictment he undoubtedly would have been sentenced to death.

Placement of Vets in Farm Jobs Arranged

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 11.—(AP)—Discharged war veterans may be placed in farm jobs through a cooperative arrangement of Oregon State college extension service, state selective service, and the state war veterans service committee.

State selective service officials will inform the state farm labor office at Corvallis of all Oregon veterans interested in farm work. Placement will be made through the county agent in the ex-servicemen's home district.
