Governor Snell said in his letter of appointment to the local leader, "the state of Oregon is again calling on its citizens for their fullhearted cooperation in the Keep Oregon Green program. AN AMERICAN PRIVILEGE

During these war days we have temporarily (we hope), given up a lot of our rights, and submitted to regimentation. But we still have one right, which is at once a privilege and a duty—to vote.

Every year millions of American citizens stay at home on election day. Each year a large percentage of these stay-at-homes cuss the Government—city, county, state or national, but usually stay at home the next election again. We maintain that nobody who deliberately fails to vote should have the right to complain.

It is estimated by the politicians that only 50% of Oregon voters will vote next Friday at the primary election. Many an election would have gone differently had every citizen exercised his right of franchise; (1940, for instance).

Douglas County has a big stake in Friday's primary election. Our own favorite sons, Harris Ellsworth and Guy Corson are in the race. Nearly every one in Douglas County will vote for both these fine men. If you like these men, be sure to vote. Your vote will not be wasted. But if you don't like them—vote anyway.

The real burning issue, however, in Friday's election, is this: ARE WE GOING TO HAVE A COUNTY FAIR? If you want a County Fair, be certain to vote. The opposition to ANY good idea is always careful to get out every possible vote to defeat it, while too many times, those in favor, knowing that the idea should go over a hundred to one, stay at home, thinking it can't lose. The result is government by minority. A county fair is a wonderful thing, the cost is small and the benefits large. Douglas County should never have given up its fair, and

CALLING ALL TURKEYS

The chances are that your boss has planted a lot of Sudan grass, rape, corn, or some other kind of green feed. Maybe it is oats or barley, or maybe he has some nice alfalfa or clover. At any rate, he has something growing for you, and the sooner you get into the field and begin eating it, the faster you are going to grow.

Of course it also means you will be going into market earlier and that angle isn't so inviting. But, still, it may as well be the next election again. We maintain that nobody who deliberately fails to vote should have the right to complain.

Recent rains will help your turkey pastures to get a good start. If you haven't planted yet, see us for seeds.

We almost forgot to mention that we have turkey feed, egg mash, chick feed, dairy feed, and all that. And after all you have been hearing to the contrary, you will be surprised to find it will give results beyond your fondest expectations.

Would you chip in a dollar to wards an up-to-date fairground, with race track, ball diamonds, ponds, ro-day-o space, and a chance to meet all your friends once a year? Very few taxpayers will have to pay more than a dollar. And where would a dollar go farther?

It is up to all of us to correct a big mistake.

We hope you won't have to say, next Saturday morning: "I could kick myself for not voting yesterday. My vote would have been the deciding vote!"

WHAT SHALL WE DO?

Don't think that Douglas County is the only place where a poultryman's first question every morning is "What shall I do?" All over the nation, the egg price keeps slipping, in spite of promises to support the price at "not less than 30c to growers."

We have just finished reading the U. S. D. A. report for April titled "The Poultry and Egg Situation." This report is put out by the BUREAU of Agricultural Economics, and is 13 pages long. (Did you say paper shortage?) There were figures and figures, history, predictions, outlook and "background," but after we had finished, we were more confused than ever.

We didn't know what to advise you before; and after reading it we were dizzy and had black spots before our eyes. They didn't say what effect removing point rationing from meats would have on the price of eggs, but you can guess. All so on the demand for poultry.

We won't guess, predict, nor advise right now. But the facts seem to be: many less chicks being raised, more flocks being heavily culled, many flocks being liquidated. As the BUREAU might say: "This may result in less eggs during the third quarter of the year and with consumer demand probably moderately equal to that of the 1937-41 average, or slightly above, and the possibility of resumption of point rationing on meats, the grower may expect egg prices to reflect an upward trend during the fourth quarter of 1944."

So there you have it. It's clear as mud, isn't it?
