Statesmen, Not Politicians, U. S. Need, Morse Says

Candidate for Senator Raps Isolationism, Urges Return Of Constitutional Rule

A government by law, not by men, and an administration directed by statesmen, not by professional politicians, are pressing needs of the United States at the present time, Wayne Morse, republican candidate for United States senator, told a fair sized audience at the courthouse in Roseburg last night. He declared that restoration of government in conformity with constitutional principles was impossible under the New Deal, and he warned that continued federal control of industry would lead to "fascism or communism, which are the same thing." He urged industry and labor to stop looking to the federal government for solution of their problems and maintain freedom of enterprise to the fullest possible extent.

Referring to the staggering public debt and the general economic condition of the country, Mr. Morse warned against two dangerous extremes—Inflation and repudiation. "Industry and labor must cooperate in protection of the dollar or suffer in the collapse that would result from neglect," Mr. Morse said. Such a financial calamity would cause us to lose postwar peace, he asserted, because it would lead to a form of state socialism.

Isolationism Scored

Taking an emphatic stand against isolationism, Mr. Morse advocated a postwar international peace agreement, backed by military force, as a preventative of future wars. "We lost the peace in 1920 because the United States was sold short," he charged. "There was no international policy, and the Kellogg-Briand peace pact was merely a futile gesture."

Since the first World war, the world has shrunk so that no country is more than 60 air bomber hours from another, Mr. Morse said. The United States is no longer sufficient unto itself, he declared, and no war can now occur anywhere in the world without the United States being affected one way or another. An international peace bond, supported by adequate military strength, was the only way to meet such a situation, Morse argued. "The old balance-of-power basis for international treaties must be junked," he said because in it lay the germs of never-ending warfare.

Hits Opponents' Record

Morse flayed the senatorial record of his primary election opponent, Senator Rufus Holman, citing the latter's frequent absences from important sessions and his votes on measures branded as detrimental to national security. He pledged himself, if elected, to introduce or support bills (1) limiting tenure of the president of the United States to two terms of four years each and (2) to prohibit any alien from either being an officer of an American labor union or an executive head of an industrial cartel.

During the open forum following his address, Mr. Morse, in response to questions, defended his course in the Harry Bridges case, introducing data tending to show an attempt to "smear" him; and referred to the recent seizure of the Montgomery Ward store in Chicago in denunciatory terms. The latter case, he declared, had its genesis in the Wagner labor law, which, he pointed out, was

one-sided in that it does not provide for equal procedural rights for industry.

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collected by that official. The committee contended that it was poor policy to continue operation of the city sewage disposal plant under exclusive operation of one man. Street Repair Fund Fixed

The council, by resolution, set up a postwar street repair sinking fund of \$4,000, a like amount to be included annually in the budget to provide funds for necessary work when material and labor become available, the action being approved by the committee.

A request for money to aid in the proposed city recreational fund was received and the sum of \$1,400 was placed in the budget for that purpose. Earl Wiley and Harold J. Hickerson, president and secretary of the chamber of commerce, explained that city and school district facilities are being pooled and that private contributions are expected to increase the fund, and that a federal grant for supervision is anticipated. The money requested of the city is to be used for construction of public rest rooms at parks and playgrounds.

George Neuner, former Douglas county district attorney, and LeRoy L. Lomax, Multnomah county, for the office of attorney general, Neuner now holding the office by appointment.

Another unique feature of the primary ballot is that no contest exists, either on the republican or democratic ticket, for any county office, the first time in the memory of local political followers that such condition has existed.

Democrats have 11 candidates from which to pick their six delegates at large, all except two of the candidates being definitely pledged in their ballot statements to President Roosevelt.

With six electors to be chosen, there are seven democrats in the field. The democrats also have an advantage over the republicans in that their presidential candidate is entered on the ballot, together with space for a write-in choice on vice-president.

The democratic ballot, however, contains nothing but wide open spaces insofar as candidates for county offices is concerned, with Roy Agee, county clerk, seeking reelection, as the only aspirant whose name appears.

To the west of Loyang, Japanese forces occupied Kanyintang, a Lunghai railway town 75 miles east of Tungwan, the gateway city to China's northwest. Southeast of Loyang the Chinese

announced the recapture of Chumatin, 120 miles south of Chungshien, further enlarging the gap between Japanese forces which at one time held complete control of the Peiping-Hankow railway.
