PROTECTION FROM FIRE

The Gardiner community has become the first in Douglas county to organize a rural fire protection district. There are numerous spots in the county where similar action, in our opinion, should be taken, particularly in residential areas adjacent to the City of Roseburg.

The state law, providing procedure under which fire protection districts are organized, requires a petition to the county court requesting the establishment of the district. A public hearing is then held, to determine whether opposition exists, and an election is ordered, if, in the opinion of the court, the proposed organization is justified.

In the event the project meets approval and officers are elected, the district then has the authority to levy a special tax to be used for the purchase of fire-fighting equipment, installation of water mains, hydrants, cisterns or other means of providing water with which to combat fires, and to pay the cost of maintaining a fire department, either on a paid or volunteer basis.

It is not necessary for any such district to be organized as a municipality before it can set up its own fire protection facilities.

Fire departments frequently are placed in a most difficult situation as the result of failure of residential areas adjacent to cities to set up control districts. It is hard for trained firemen with adequate apparatus at hand to sit at the city limits and watch homes burning to the ground only a short distance away.

Yet, if the fire engines are taken outside the municipal boundaries, or if firemen join in fighting the blaze outside organized territory, insurance is invalidated and firemen cannot be compensated for injuries.

City fire departments may, however, go to the aid of any other municipality or to any territory where fire protection districts have been established.

The ordinary city fire department is not able, under normal circumstances, to fight a fire outside the municipality. This is due to the fact that no advance preparations have been made for water reservoirs, hydrants or other equipment to make water available for the engines.

The regulation, preventing equipment from being used outside organized districts or municipalities, is based upon the obvious unfairness of furnishing equipment, maintained at public expense, for the benefit of property owners who pay nothing towards the maintenance cost.

The town of Gardiner, as has been previously stated, has become the first community in Douglas county to organize under the provisions of the state law. It is to be hoped the example will encourage other communities, particularly the residential areas surrounding municipalities, to take like action. Some beautiful homes are located adjacent to the City of Roseburg which should be protected against fire. A lot of hard feeling would be created should there be a major blaze in one of these areas while the city fire department sat nearby unable to extend aid.

The needed protection is available at moderate cost. In fact, in many cases reduction in insurance rates would more than offset the tax. It is time, we believe, citizens in the residential areas gave serious consideration to the matter of providing protection from fire through the channels open to them.

Truck Tires Will Be Inspected at Roseburg Stations

A central OPA truck inspection station was opened today in Roseburg at 659 N. Jackson, it was announced by J. H. Hedric, associate district mileage representative, Portland.

The move is in line with the national policy to take all possible steps to conserve truck tires, Hedric said. Initial inspection will be made by official OPA truck tire inspectors, and tires to be replaced will be delivered to the central station and held until examined by official OPA tire examiners of the Portland district office.

To further the procedure, the Roseburg war price and rationing board has appointed the following men or shops as official truck tire inspectors: Goodyear store, 101 S. Jackson; Hansen Motor Co., Oak and Stephens; O. K. Rubber Welders, West Lane; Holgate Service station; Sutherland; U. S. Tire Store, 246 S. Stephens; and West's Firestone store, 229 N. Jackson, the two latter in Roseburg.

All official OPA truck tire inspection stations will deliver the truck tire that is to be replaced with the application, certificate of war necessity, and the inspection record to the central inspection station. Approved applications will be delivered to the local rationing board every day, and certificates for replacement
