Two Resign From OWI in Dispute Over Publicity

WASHINGTON, May 18—(AP)—Constantine Poulos and Charles Olson of the Office of War Information's foreign language section, resigned today with the assertion that George W. Healy, Jr., OWI domestic director, had "hamstrung" the activities of their division.

Healy quickly issued a statement branding the claim as untrue.

Poulos, acting chief of the section, and Olson, assistant chief, contended that what they termed interference of Healy and of Dowsley Clark, director of the OWI news bureau, had prevented them from functioning to offset Axis propaganda aimed at creating dissension among America's 35,000,000 citizens of foreign ancestry.

Healy's statement said his sole "interference" has been to insist that the information dispensed by Poulos' section be checked for accuracy before being distributed to American newspapers printed in foreign languages. This meant translating the material into English before distribution.

"Without this precaution we could not be sure that personal views were not being substituted for straight and simple information," Healy's statement said.

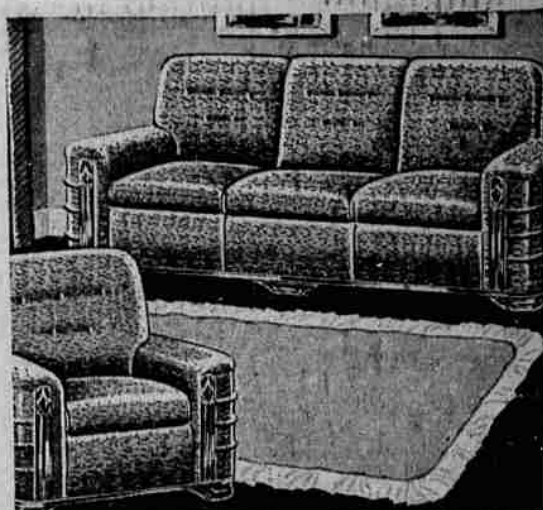

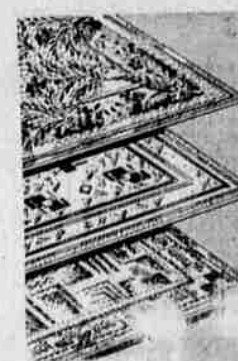
