IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled action on or before the last day of publication of this summons, which is four weeks from the day of first publication of this summons.

said period of four weeks being the time prescribed for the publication thereof, and if you fail to so appear and answer the said complaint, for want thereof the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief demanded therein, to-wit: the condemnation and appropriation for public highway purposes of the following described real property, to-wit:

A parcel of land lying in the northeast quarter (NE1) of section 30, township 30 south, range 3 west, W. M., being a portion of the following described property: that tract of land which was conveyed by that certain deed to Julius L. 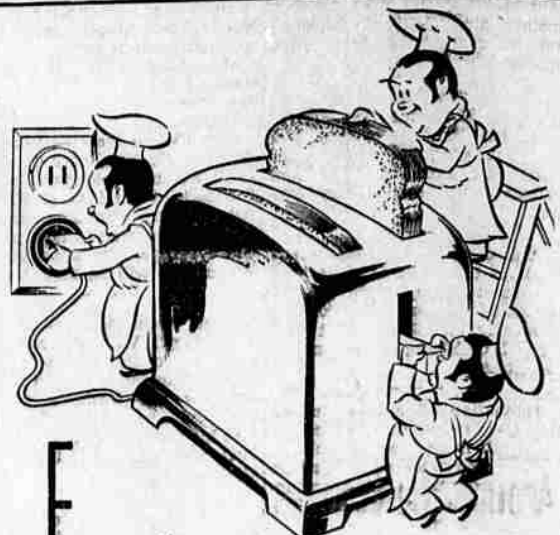
