## Omer J. Monger Engaged to Head Sutherlin Schools

**Other Teachers Also Hired For Coming Term; District Frees Itself of All Debt**

Omer J. Monger, for the past six years superintendent of schools at Maupin, Oregon, has been employed by the Sutherlin school district to fill the place left vacant by the resignation of Superintendent W. A. Gilchrist. Mr. Monger received his A. B. degree from Earlham college, Richmond, Indiana, and has had graduate work in the field of administration at University of Oregon. He also has had graduate work in physical education and has coached championship teams in basketball, football and track.

During his six years at Maupin, he supervised installation of a turf athletic field, modernized the school library, improved facilities for teaching of commercial subjects and assisted the student body in disposing of indebtedness amounting to \$800. The high school, under his supervision, qualified for admission into the Northwest association of colleges and high schools.

**Other Teachers Also Hired**—Mrs. Monger also will assist in the schools, having had experience as a teacher in English and speech. As coach of the dramatic department at Maupin, her students won first place in the Mid-Columbia one-act play contest for B schools.

Mrs. Elsie Irving of Wilbur has accepted a contract as a teacher in the Sutherlin high school. Mrs. Carl Wimberly, Roseburg, who was employed as a substitute during the current year, has taken a contract to serve on the high school staff next year.

Mrs. Lois Palmer, Wilbur, will again teach the 8th grade; Mrs. Thora Powell, employed at Sutherlin for two years, will continue in the 7th grade; Mrs. Clara Trozelle, also employed for two years, will teach the 6th grade; Mrs. Vera Mathewman, who has been teaching at Nonpareil, has been secured for the 4th and 5th grades; Mrs. Elsie Spackman, who was employed last year, has been reelected for the 2nd and 3rd grades, and Mrs. Hazel Davis will continue in the primary department. Some adjustments in the grades are expected in the fall, depending upon the number of students registered. A considerable increase is anticipated, due to the great number of new residents in the district.

**District Now Free of Debt**—The Sutherlin district during the past week forwarded to State Treasurer Leslie Scott a check to retire all outstanding indebtedness. The district is free of debt for the first time in 35 years. A few warrants remain outstanding because the holders have not been located, but ample funds are in the treasury to meet the warrants when submitted.

At the last meeting of the board of directors, Anton Coenenberg, Icel Clark and Howard Cracroft, a vote of thanks and appreciation was given the retiring superintendent, Mr. Gilchrist, for his cooperation and efficient work in the interest of the district during the past two years.

## Forest Protection Need Emphasized By V. V. Harpham

Vernon V. Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua National forest, was guest speaker at the Roseburg Lions club dinner meeting held in the Umpqua hotel last night, selecting as his topic "Keep Oregon Green." Mr. Harpham pointed out that forty per cent of the 1200 to 1400 average annual fires in the state of Oregon, which now leads the union in the production of timber, has a stand of approximately seventy billion feet of timber, the matter of fire prevention is of major importance. To emphasize the destruction caused by fire, Supervisor Harpham cited the Tillamook burn in which from ten to twelve billion feet of timber was destroyed in a few days.

A great fire hazard is created, Mr. Harpham said, by the fact that two-thirds of the volume of timber now used in industry results in waste material which is left on cut-over lands. A survey recently completed by his office, Mr. Harpham stated, indicated that four hundred million feet of timber will probably be cut in Douglas county this year. He pointed out that this amount was as much as a sustained-yield policy would allow and that the establishment of alcohol, plastic, and chemical plants in this community would do away with a great fire hazard, utilize wood waste, and keep the timber industry on a permanent basis.

## House Votes Bills For Bigger Navy, Equipment

WASHINGTON, May 19—(AP)—The house voted to build another million tons of landing craft, with a vociferous demand of some members that General Douglas MacArthur get most of them "so he can carry the fight into the heart of Japan."

A moment later the house also passed and sent to the senate likewise a bill authorizing an additional \$65,000,000 for naval ordnance and production facilities, including \$15,000,000 for development of rocket guns.

## Quick Return of Forms Urged on Fuel Users

Application forms are being mailed to all registered users of fuel oil in the Roseburg area, L. V. Hammock, chairman of the Roseburg OPA War Price and Rationing board, reported today. Mr. Hammock urges that the forms be filled out and returned to the board as quickly as possible in order that the work of processing the applications and issuing oil ration coupons can be started without delay.

The new re-application form

contains only six simple questions which the board needs answered in order to renew rations for private dwellings for the next year, Mr. Hammock stated. Early return of the forms and issuance of coupons will enable dealers to fill consumer's tanks during the summer months and thus add appreciably to the dealers' storage capacity for winter months.

## Aerial Bombs To Battle Crickets

BOISE, Idaho, May 19—(AP)—It's "bombs away" next week in modern aerial warfare against crop-destroying Mormon crickets in eastern Idaho.

Low-flying planes will spread poison bait over approximately 190,000 acres in four counties by the U. S. Department of Agriculture as the most intensely infested cricket area in the nation this year.

The bait, sifted out at the rate of 20 pounds per acre and so evenly livestock and birds cannot pick it up, is spread over range across which the wingless grasshoppers must migrate to reach croplands.

Airplanes were used for the first time last year and with outstanding success according to Dr. Claude Wakeland, chief of the grasshopper control division, department of agriculture.

In 1938, there were 18,000,000 infested acres in 10 western states. This year only an estimated 1,000,000 acres are infested, primarily in eastern Idaho, Wyoming, Nevada and Oregon.

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## Soldier of Glide Leads Unit That Slays 14 Nippons

LINGA LINGA PLANTATION, New Britain—(Delayed)—A small body of United States marines, taking part in a mopping up operation in the Eleonora bay area, had the unusual experience of setting up a defense around a native garden during one of their patrols.

It happened on the second day of a mission during which a 20-man unit led by First Lieutenant James R. Currier, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph L. Currier of Glendale, Ore., killed 14 Japs.

"We spent a night near a native village," Lieutenant Currier, a 1942 graduate of the University of Washington, related, "and the next morning we were told that the women were staying away from their vegetable gardens because they were afraid of the Japs."

The marines quickly solved the problem. Escorting a native party to the gardens, located on the side of a hill, they set up a small defense perimeter and maintained a guard while the natives gathered their crops.

"But we didn't have any trouble," Lieutenant Currier said. "As a matter of fact, we didn't see a single live Jap all day."

The previous day, however, had proved far more successful for the patrol. After making a landing and traveling about three miles inland, the unit encountered

ed nine Japs in a small bivouac area.

Three marines cleaned them out in a hurry, with a Leatherneck from Detroit knocking off five of the group.

"We got three others along the trail, and then two more who tried to make a run for it. That night we set up an ambush, but nobody walked into it," Lieutenant Currier said.

The Japs killed and captured during the operation were believed to be remnants of the enemy forces routed by the marines on Cape Gloucester in December and January.
